Commercial Report.

NEW YORK, 18.—Following is the

report of the condition of trade here

for the week ending to-day.

The general business has been

during the week, and the movement of

merchandise of all kinds has been

extensive. The number of buyers in

the various markets is very large,

and there is widespread anticipation

of an active, healthy trade for

the fall and winter. Money con-

siderably more liberal; exchange

shows a large increase for

the month of last year, while outside of

a slight falling off.

At present business is doing

with jobbers than with commission

houses. Buyers from large distribut-

ing points South and West are here

in force making their fall purchases.

Gold and silver are firm in price

and in somewhat better demand than

last week. The condition of

this interest is satisfactory.

The market for wheat has been

quite steady, with a slight easing off

in the latter part of the week, and

closing moderately.

Corn has been somewhat unsettled

and prices have declined. Operators

are inclined to take hold.

Oats have been the leading feature

of the market. August deliv-

eries have fluctuated considerably

within the range of 3 to 5 cents per

bushel, and the market shows quite

strength something below the

prices of a week ago.

In the lard and pork products fresh

lard has been in very fair request

for export, but the general tendency

of the market has been downward.

Prices in all descriptions of pork

products have somewhat declined

and the market shows some strength.

Speculators are not much inclined to

operate.

Transactions in cotton for the

week have been dull and moderate in

amount. The prices are quiet

with fluctuations within the range

of 6 to 7 points, the wide range being

from 10 to 14 cents per pound.

Stocks of wool are generally

accumulating and choice selections

are in fair request. Prices are

fairly well maintained, otherwise nothing of interest.

The petroleum market has been

comparatively quiet with fluctuations

within a narrow range

of 10 to 12 cents per barrel.

Ordinary carboys of oil are quite

firm, but the market is quiet.

In freight, owing to the large tonnage,

grain room has advanced

so much as to restrict shipments.

This applies to petroleum, either

as a fuel or as a lubricant.

Freight rates are high and the volume of business moderate.

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
