North Ogden's Missionary Work in Fifty-two Years.

North Ogden, Weber Co., March 17.--A committee has been appointed by the North Ogden farmers to negotiate with the Oregon Short Line with a view to put in a spur to North Ogdeu, to facilitate the handling of the hun-dreds of cars of beets, fruits and can-ned goods that go out annually.
