### CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

Union Depot Proposition Discussed-Sunday Closing of Drug Stores.

Stewart-Johnson Wedding-Two Boys Sent to Industrial School-News Briefs.

Provo. Utah Co., March 25 .- At the neeting of the city council last evening the committee on streets and alleys reported favorably on the petition of the R. G. Western Railway company asking for a franchise to erect a depot on a portion of Academy avenue and Sixth South street, and presented a bill for an ordinance granting said franchise. An effort was made by some of the counsel to have action deferred for one week in order to give the two companles further time to agree on a union depot, and Agent Craig of the Oregon Short Line company asked that this time be granted, stating that the quesion was being considered in good faith by the general managers of the two companies. He also stated that to dopt the report of the committee would give the Rio Grande Western company an advantage over the Oregon Short Line company. Mr. Craig assured the counsel that his company was willing to join in a union depot, and if they failed to unite with the R. G. Western, would erect an independent depot. In sup-port of immediate action a telegram

dated today, from Superintendent Wel-by to General Manager Herbert was Mr. Welby, in his telegram, asked if there was anything tangible in the report that the two companies would unite in building a union depot. Manager Herbert answered that his company was ready to consider a p osition from the Oregon Short ompany for a union depot, but that his company was ready to proceed if

he other company would not join and indicated that he was anxious to have the council act on the petition. The report of the committee was adopted and the ordinance passed its first reading. The ordinance provides that the railway company shall build a depot to cost at least \$8,000 within one year from the acceptance of the franchise. The company is permitted to extend the building 15 feet over the

west side of Academy avenue with per-mission to extend a platform twelve feet further into the street, Mayor Taylor presented a communication recommending that an ordin-ance be enacted providing for the closing of drug stores on Sundays, except for selling drugs and medicines on rescriptions of physicians. Referred the committee or judiciary. Mayor Taylor appointed Samuel Lid-

diard for city building inspector. The appointment was confirmed.

The committee on finance reported purchasing two teams, one at a cost of \$350 and one at a cost of \$315.

The committee on judiciary reported on a lunch car which had been operated on the street for some time, rec-ommending that the city marshal be instructed to direct the proprietor to remove the car. Report adopted.
