a study concluded that the method might be employed for the amputation of lower limbs of patients who were unable to | ratified. withstand the effects of anaesthetics.

The method consists in the deadening of the nerves in the limbs by the in-jection of cocaine in the vertebral cavity above the joint where the nerves controlling the lower limbs branch from the spinal cord. The patient had suffered a gangrenous affection of the leg and amputation became necessary to save her life. She was not in a condition to make the use of an anaesthetic safe and the surgeon decided to try the method which had proved successful in a Berlin hospital

The drug was injected into the potient's vertebral cavity a short distance below the waist line and soon she announced that she had lost all feeling in her lower limbs while she was fully conscious of what was going on and had the full use of all her faculties.

The limb was removed two inches below the hip, and after the effects of the drug had passed away the woman products. said she felt well. The prospects for her recovery are good.

#### Bad Silver Dollars.

Chicago, Feb. 19 .-- Leaders in Polish national circles of this city say there is a secret national Polish league, which extends throughout Europe and America, and that it had existed not only for fourteen years, but ever since the breakup of the last struggle for Poland's independence in 1862. One of the

leaders said: The secret organization has not been plotting against any government for the freeing of Poland by force of arms any other method. During the last ew weeks the Polish national organizations in this city which are such have no direction with the secret league, have been receiving information that the Russian government has resumed persecution of the Poles, and that wholesale arrests are being made in Warsaw, the seat of the so-called cen-tral committee of the national league.

The league began a spirited agita tion December 9, of last year, when a circular was issued from Warsaw, appealing to all Poles to equip themselves both mentally and physically so that in case of need they might be ready to serve the cause of freeing Poland. The circular called on all Poles to continue the agitation for Poland and to study and propagate Polish national spirit.

"Since the publication of the circular, books and pamphlets which, because of their intense Polish patriotic expres sions, are prohibited in Poland by Russia have been printed in Chicago and other citles, sent to Europe, placed in the bands of agents of the league and distributed in Poland." In speaking of the Polish league and
