

# ALL LINES ARE GENERALLY FAIR

Financial Situation Pronounced  
Good on Outside Enter-  
prise Demands.

## GOODS GOING WITH SEASON

Trade is Up to Expectation With  
Healthy Increase in Some  
Special Circles.

The financial situation during the past week has been very good, with the demand for money strong. There are a number of new enterprises in prospect, electric light projects, irrigation canals and kindred propositions, and non-resident promoters have been visiting this city to feel the financial pulse to ascertain what opportunities there may be to obtain money for these purposes. So far as has been learned, all these projects appear meritorious, with nothing at present to dampen expectations of any one regarding the business situation for the coming season. In fact, everything looks healthful and encouraging. However, this language will have to be modified if applied to conditions outside of Utah, especially in the east, as matters are quiet there. There is a slight improvement from day to day, though the growth is not as rapid as was expected. But in the estimation of conservative men, it is as rapid as ought to be to have a healthy effect.

### THE CLEWS LETTER.

Henry Clews, in his last circular, says: Money is easy everywhere. Not in New York, but in Paris, Frankfort and Berlin the tendency of interest rates is still downwards. This, of course, is mainly due to the depression prevailing in commerce and industry in the ports of the world. As a capital is accumulating and slightly sinking every form of safe and profitable employment. The effect of this situation upon the security markets is marked. In the first place, it causes a good demand for high grade investments from conservative investors and institutions, who have no regard for preservation of principal than other dividends on speculative stocks. At the same time another class of buyers, viz., those generally continue to sustain the market, partly because the dullness of business and diminution of profits lessens their purchasing ability, and partly because they recognize that the prices of average stocks are much too high in view of existing conditions. The buyers and big market leaders have successfully resisted any important decrease in stock prices, but the effect of cheap money. There are reasons for believing, however, that those wise policy it was to support the market and resist natural tendencies to accumulate all, if not more than, the stocks they desire, and that in the absence of buyers their position is anything but a satisfactory one, notwithstanding their unquestioned financial strength.

### REAL ESTATE.

The local real estate market does not seem to have sustained any startling move, in consequence of what the friends of the saloon are pleased to regard as "defeat" for prohibition, but remains just fair, as it usually is at the time of year. In reality, local property conditions are not very different from year to year. John J. Daly is forging ahead with his new building operations and has just placed a \$70,000 mortgage to raise funds for extending same. James T. Keith is buying lots in the block west of Holy Cross hospital to open a new street and build dwellings. Harriman continues to spend money improving the street railway system and putting up new car houses. Con Newhouse is still hurrying on the completion of his new skyscraper and planning to make of his banking rooms there the most elegant in the entire west. The new master at Garfield is "go" and others have been placed for 5,000,000.
