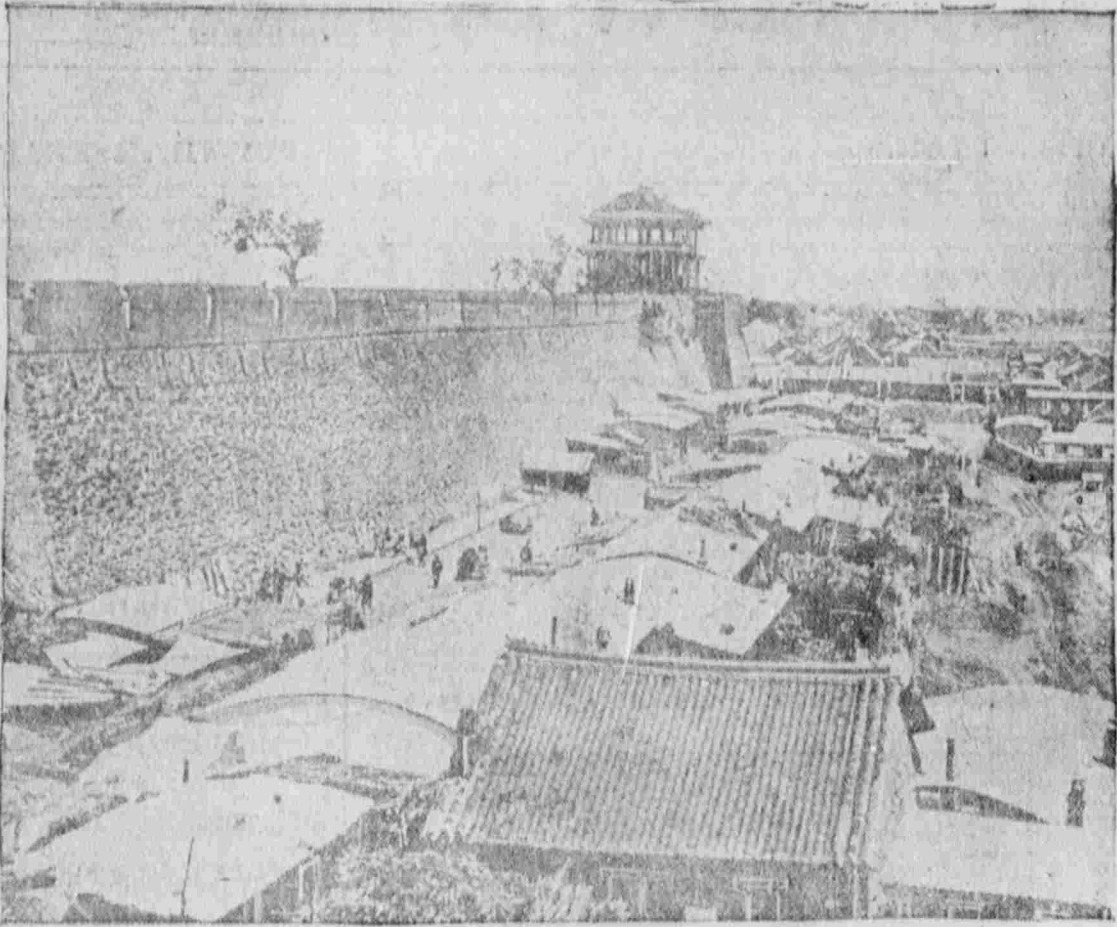


SOME CITY OF MUKDEN FORTIFICATIONS.

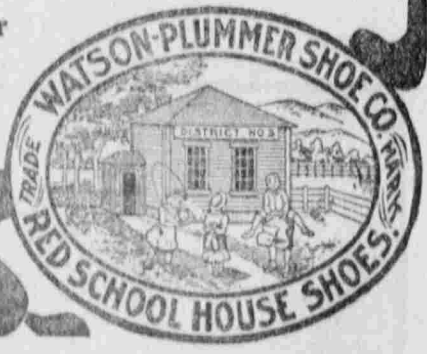

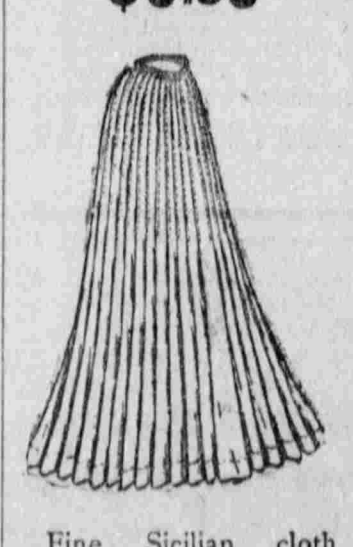
