Hand Mutilated.—The following special came this afternoon:

PAROWAN, Nov. 25, 1880.

Editor Deseret News:—Last evening, while Mr. Cort, Presbyterian minister, was running lumber through a planer, his left hand caught in the knives and was badly mangled. The thumb and two fingers and part of another were cut off. He was standing on an icy board at the time and is supposed to have slipped and fell.

Police Court.—Five young men were arrested last evening for disturbance, profanity and assaulting the officers who expostulated with them for disorderly conduct. Blows were exchanged and a number of knockdowns occurred. The trial has been set for to-morrow at 2 p.m.

The Mill Creek water case still "drags its slow length along." This is the third day of the hearing. The jury begin to look pale and interesting.

Macallister the Wizard.—Macallister draws his nightly crowds to the Theatre. As a wizard and prestidigitator, he has few equals. His generous distribution of costly and substantial gifts to the holders of lucky numbers, also makes his entertainment one of great attraction to the general public. A Fine Feast.—One of the most sumptuous meals ever given in this city was that spread in the Walker house dining room yesterday afternoon. All who were invited to eat on the occasion were requested to come hungry, and be filled. The menu embraced all that the palate could wish for, and a good deal more than the English tongue could pronounce. Mr. Murray, the gentlemanly French steward, surpassed himself, and that is saying a great deal.

A Caution.—James Green & Sons, successors to J. W. Robinson & Co., look agents of this city, desire to warn the public against giving subscriptions and paying money to a young man named J. B. Olson, who is thought to reside at American Fork, but who is now traveling through the south, canvassing for and representing himself as an agent of the above firm. He is entirely unauthorized by them, and those who advance means to him do so at their own risk.

Deseret Museum.—The following donations have been received and are respectfully acknowledged by the Curator: A copy of the *Maldstone* (Kent, England), *Journal of October 20th, 1793*, presented by Sister Dr. Ferguson. At that time the danger of invasion by Bonaparte was the topic of absorbing interest; we learn that England then had a standing army of 100,000 men to defend the shores of Great Britain, and Mr. Pitt had made a proposition in the House of Commons to raise the militia as a further means of resistance to the enemy. The French had at this time met with reverses in Italy, the hospital at Verona alone contained several thousand sick, and "Bonaparte's whole force scarcely amounted to 30,000 men fit for duty." This interesting paper is filed for reference. Brother Lemon has presented a human cranium, before leaving for Arizona where he will collect specimens illustrative of natural history, for the Museum.

Ogden Notes.—From observations taken during a flying visit to the Junction City, yesterday, we glean a few items respecting matters in general in that flourishing town: Yesterday was celebrated as a general holiday, and thanksgiving and turkey eating was the order of the day.

F. S. Richards, Esq., County Attorney of Weber County, gave an elegant dinner, at which were present Judge F. D. Richards, several leading members of the bar, the jury and a number of prominent citizens. It was a very fine affair and the utmost cordiality prevailed. The town is rapidly growing, not only in the business portions, but all over the place are springing up neat little residences, with here and there a splendid and costly building. The new Co-operative Store, which is truly a fine and substantial structure is rapidly approaching completion, and by Christmas eve, the interior will be so far finished as to permit the store to be thrown open for the sale of retail goods. The old Co-op store is to be occupied by a clothing firm.

S. W. Sears, Esq., the enterprising and efficient manager of this branch of Z. C. M. I., will leave for San Francisco to-morrow (Saturday) in company with Gen. H. S. El-dredge, Superintendent of the parent institution. The friends of Mrs. Belle Sears will be pleased to learn that she is convalescent from her recent severe attack of illness.

Ogden's schools are in active operation, under an excellent system. The Central School, to which the others are graded, has a number of teachers, with Prof. L. F. Monch as principal, who also exercises general supervision over the entire system. Scarcity of coal has been felt here as well as here, but yesterday Capt. Mills, coal agent, had his teams busy all day delivering the needful, of which there seemed to be a pretty good supply.

The Union Pacific express, due there at 5:30 p.m., was just five hours late last evening. The Utah Central did not wait.

Ogden anticipates the electric light about the beginning of the new year, and with this a water system, for which a grant has been given to a company, she will be quite a distance in advance of western towns of her size.

Recovering From Sunstroke.—Mr. James W. Stevens, carpenter and builder of this city, went on a bathing excursion, on August 4th, with some of his friends, to Lake Shore. While in the water he was seized with a fainting sensation, and was taken to land as quickly as possible. It was then discovered by his friends that his speech was affected, but that otherwise he seemed all right until on the way home in the cars when the fainting sensation returned. On arriving in this city it was found that his left side was partially paralyzed, but with slight assistance he walked to a hack. On putting his hand into his pocket to pay the driver he found that he had lost the sense of feeling and was obliged to call upon others to take the money from his pocket to pay the fare. Since that time he has been under the able treatment of Dr. Holland, and is gradually recovering from what was decided to be a case of sunstroke. He hopes to be around again soon.
