

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRICAL.**—The performance of "Elizabeth" was in every respect a complete success. The piece was splendidly mounted; the playing was capital, and the personation of Elizabeth by Miss Ince was her crowning triumph here. An English friend of ours, who is strong in the faith that royalty is a useless and expensive nuisance, declared that all the bitterness of hatred against the tyranny of Elizabeth was aroused in his heart, as he watched the performance. He could not see Miss Ince, nor a play, but a scene of two vivid reality, with a haughty, imperious, delicate woman in the foreground. Her acting indeed was most excellent, and those who have seen her in other characters here would not have known her as Elizabeth, except for the full volume of voice which she ever has in most complete control. Mr. McKenzie's Essex was very good; and Miss Adams, Mrs. Bowring, Miss Alexander, Messrs. Lindsay, Graham, Hardie, Thompson, etc., did full justice to the characters entrusted to them. Miss Ince was loudly called for at the close, and appeared, bowing her acknowledgments.

**RETURNED MISSIONARIES.**—Among the missionaries who returned yesterday was Elder Lorenzo D. Rudd. He left this city on the 20th of April, 1884; went to England; labored there about two years in Reading, Derby and Cheltenham Conferences, returned to the United States and visited his friends; and labored in the east, principally in St. Louis, until he started for Utah.

**ELDER C. C. CHRISTIANSEN** also returned yesterday, from his mission to Scandinavia.

**FIRE IN ST. JOSEPH.**—By a telegram to President Young, received this morning from St. Joseph on the Muddy, bearing information that on the 18th a fire had broken out in the fort, during a gale, and in half an hour the meeting house and nineteen dwelling houses, with most of their contents, were consumed. The men were in the fields at work; and the houses being thatched with flags burned so rapidly that they were destroyed before the brethren could arrive. The principal sufferers are Bro's O. P. Miles, W. Streeter, Billingsby, Thomas Farmer, Day, Chaffin, Gibson, Watt, Cahoon, Ferguson and Mays. Bros. Weller, Pratt, Clyde and Rydaleh and others now north have also lost their goods. The fire originated with some children roasting potatoes, near Bro. Streeter's place. Bro. Snodgrass telegraphs that relief will be sent down to the sufferers.

**CALLER.**—We had the pleasure of a call today from S. D. Johnston, Esq., representing the firm of Byrn, Bowen & Co., of Chicago, importers and jobbers of crockery, glassware, etc., who is here attending to business for the firm. He likes our city and has enjoyed himself during his brief stay thus far; and he has been enabled to combine profit with pleasure, in furthering business matters.

**AT WELLSVILLE.**—By Deseret Telegraph we learn that President Brigham Young and Company left Brigham City at 9 o'clock this morning, and arrived at Wellsville at 20 minutes past 12. They proceed to Logan to-night.

**CAPTAIN HAIGHT'S TRAIN.**—General Edredge passed Captain Haigh's train yesterday at the head of Echo Cañon. They had lost some fifteen head of mules on the Muddy; and would be detained a little hunting them, but as they had got word of the detention would be short. The train will, however, probably not be in till Monday.

**COMING ON.**—The track on the U. P. R. R., on the 15th, was laid to within ninety miles of Green River. Prospects are fair for the rails reaching that point by the 1st of October, at the farthest; probably by the middle of September.

**INTELLECTUAL.**—The lack of a regular book store in this city, has been lamented by many who have liberally encouraged anything approaching to it, and have been compelled to pay better postage on works which they desired to obtain speedily from the east or west. This void is about to be filled by Mr. O. H. Elliot, who has arrived from the west with a large stock of books, scientific, educational, agricultural, legal, philosophical, historical and miscellaneous; with general stationary and everything needed to complete the stock of a first-class house, which he will open next week. There is little doubt but the opening of so desirable a house in the city will be appreciated by our citizens.

**EXPECTED.**—Lawrence Barrett and John McCullough are expected to arrive by stage from the West this evening.

**WILL NOT PROMISE.**—A recent letter in the Cheyenne Leader, written from Green River City, intimates that a fight is looming up between the citizens of that burg and the U. P. R. R. agents backed by the military. The U. P. R. R. agents claim the ground on which the city stands, and demand pay for the lots. The citizens claim to have a title to the land from the Overland Mail Company; but they are willing to pay a bonus if the company will promise to make Green River the winter terminus. This the agents will not promise, and the military sustain them in their claim. The company's agents talk of having a town built on Black's Fork to take the wind out of Green River City's sail; and Green River says it don't care, it will "fight it out on that line," if it takes till snow flies.
