LOCAL BRIEFS.

Free Delivery for Garfield—Garfield is to have a free delivery of newspapers which preparation is now being made.

Revenue Collections—The revenue collections for August in this district comprising Utah, Idaho and Montana, amounted to \$67,275.59, as against \$54,503.67 for the same month last year. The principal increase is in beer.

State to Purchase Bonds—At the meeting of the state board of commissioners yesterday it was decided to purchase \$5,000 worth of Castle Dale school bonds at \$1.12 1/2. The bonds are payable in 20 years and bear 5 per cent interest.

New Substation—There will be a new postoffice substation at the established Oct. 1, at the state university with registry and money order departments. This will be a great convenience to the students and residents of that neighborhood.

G. R. Cleveland Is Named—G. R. Cleveland of the Utah board of land and mineral surveyors has been appointed by Grand Justice Ruler John C. Tenor of the 10th, deputy grand justice for the jurisdiction of Utah, including the judges at Salt Lake, Ogden, Park City, Provo and Eureka.

Jewish Herald Appears—The Jewish Herald of this city made its appearance last evening, edited by David L. Cohen, and is the only Jewish publication in the intermountain region. The Herald is a weekly paper, and has gotten up paper, and the first number contains large full tones of Samuel Newhouse and Harry S. Joseph.

LAUNDRY SAYS ITS LITTLE SAY

Presents Its View of Strike Participated in by "Mangle" Girls.

"SYMPATHIZERS" ARE BACK.

New Hands, Says Manager, Wanted Before They Had Learned The A. B. C. of Laundering.

A strike bug flew into the American Linen Supply company's laundering department yesterday, and when it flew out, it was followed by 25 girls, who marched down the street shouting and singing. The girls had asked for a raise of \$1 per week in their wages—averaging \$1.25—and when this was refused by the manager, they quit. They are to organize themselves into a union and thus get the encouragement and aid of the local labor union. But in face of a statement made this morning by Manager Wm. R. Pollock, this step seems unnecessary, as the girls have rendered themselves jobless. The strikers asked for a raise of \$1 per week, and from nine to twelve hours a day, and these hours were too long and the work too strenuous for \$1.50 a week.

MANAGER POLLOCK TALKS. Manager Pollock of the laundry was holding hawk at an end at the strike this morning. He was delighted at being offered an opportunity to lay the company's view of the strike before the public. The girls came upon us suddenly yesterday morning. Some strange man was in here early in the morning and shortly after a number of girls took their hats and coats and walked out without giving us the slightest notice of their intentions," he said. "At noon others went out. Our service was not interrupted, but as the girls sang as they marched away, large crowds gathered. Investigation led to the discovery that the girls were out because they considered their wages too small—but I want to explain the situation fairly and impartially. The girls who went out, or the greater portion of them, are apprentices. Some of them have been working but a few days, and, naturally, they were not paid as much as older hands. They were paid \$1.50 a week, and they were in correspondence to their ability, coat ironers, getting from \$5 to \$10."

NEW GIRLS APPEARING. "The new hands were put to work on the mangle machines. We start work at 3 o'clock, have three-quarters of an hour for lunch and are through the day's work by 4:30 or 5 o'clock. When the 'mangle' girls went out, some of the older girls took their place. The company during the summer installed \$25,000 worth of improvements, including an enlarged electric light plant."
