LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

PRESIDENT YOUNG AND COMPANY. By the courtesy of President Young, A. Smith we are enabled to lay the following telegram before our readers respecting the movements of our meetings held by President Young and company.

REMARKS. Disinfectants. We notice in several places in the city, that the walls and fences are being disinfected and plastered over with advertisements of panacea for the various ills that flesh is heir to. Such devices are indicative of quackery, and no man who has confidence in the system which he practices and in his own skill as a physician should resort to such a method of making his merits known. There are very few people who are favorably impressed by such notices. When this plan of advertising was first adopted in this city, and we saw the stores water-tight in the way of the Temple Block and of the Ward Meeting Houses, and the citizens' houses disfigured by advertisements of various kinds, we were simply disgusted. If we had previously had any inclination to patronize those who took this method of informing the public what they had for sale, the sight of these disfigured fences and public buildings would have turned us against their nostrums, wares and publications. The plan is a bad one. It was commended in this country by those whose examples should not be followed by any one of good taste or who takes any pride in the beauty and adornment of his city. No man's premises should be defiled in this manner, not at least, without his consent, and public buildings, where liberties of this kind have been taken with them, as we see has been the case in one instance, not a thousand miles from the Fourteenth Ward Assembly Rooms—the disfigurement should be cleared off by the use of a little sand stone and water, as had to be done with the walls of the Temple Block.

PREPARING TO ERECT A FOUNTAIN. We noticed that men, in the employ of Hon. Wm. Jennings, are busily engaged in digging a trench down the side walk on South Temple Street, and are laying pipes to convey water for a fountain, which Mr. Jennings is about to have erected on the lawn in front of his residence, he having obtained permission from the City Council to have the necessary supply of water. This will greatly enhance the beauty of Brother Jennings' mansion and surroundings, which already attract the eyes of all charming every beholder.

WEBER CITY.—By the letter of Bishop Peterson, in to-day's News, it will be seen that quarantine and every other precaution possible has been adopted to stop the spread of the small pox at Weber City. This is as it should be, and shows that the people there are alive to the necessity of energetic measures in the present emergency. We were informed, however, this morning, by a gentleman from that section of country, that the people of Morgan City have not been so prompt. We are assured that at that place, although there have been one or two authenticated cases of the disease, quarantine has not been established, but that the people residing there and in the settlements adjoining are allowed to enter and leave at pleasure.

If this be true, we cannot but believe that the disease and all danger of it have disappeared, for it is hardly likely that the citizens of Morgan would be guilty of such culpable neglect in the presence of real danger.

Since writing the preceding we are in receipt of a letter from Wm. Eddington, Esq., Mayor of Morgan City, in which the information referred to above is confirmed. Bro. Eddington says there has been four cases of the varioloid disease in Morgan City, one of which was very severe. One of the afflicted parties has recovered, and the others are progressing. The whole of them and their families were removed from the city to the small pox hospital, about a mile distant, and "every precaution" is being taken by both town and county officers, to check, and prevent the spread of the malady. He does not say anything about quarantine being established at Morgan, which we regard as one of the most essential precautions, and indispensable where there is any risk of the disease being communicated to adjoining settlements. Quarantine undoubtedly entails inconvenience wherever established, but better endure temporary inconvenience than run the risk of spreading a mortal contagion through a settled district.
