## Important Arrests at Kenosha.

On Marshal Davis, of Cranston, giving notice to Chief Davenport that he had captured the man "Red Phillips," who was wanted here on account of the bombing of Chicago's Post office, a strong posse of U. S. Marshals, under Davenport, arrested Charles Egan, as the case is now in the hands of the U. S. marshal. Deputy Sheriff John H. Hartley, the mounting constable, and S. F. Smith, who met him, also, were in the county jail awaiting a hearing.

Deputy Balliett also brought back with him one N. Miller, another who participated in stopping a U. S. mail train on the night of the bombing, but who had gone to Wyoming when arrested. He also is in jail awaiting a hearing on the same old charge.

## Thrown from a Cart.

At about 8 o'clock last evening G. C. Clegg, a young man from Washington, stepped in a cart, his horse became frightened at a passing street car and started running, throwing Clegg to the ground. The animal then started in the opposite direction, and after a short and exciting racing race, Dr. George Clegg, who dressed the wounds, which will not prove serious.

## A Chinaman's Serious Injury.

A Chinaman was given an opportunity to return to his death. He was driving a team of Washington Avenue, when his horses became frightened and ran into the Ogden river, throwing the Chinaman over the stream. Dr. Clegg, who attended to the injured man, said the poor little fellow, who had not been to the hospital, was a Chinaman, and the doctor said he was the only Chinaman in Ogden.

## GUATEMALA'S FIRST LADY.

The wife of President Barrios now visiting her native country.

Among the visitors to the United States, and who will probably come this way in a few days on her journey to New Orleans from California, is Mrs. A. de Reyna Barrios, wife of the President of Guatemala.

She is accompanied on her trip by the Misses Martha and Adelina Belenguer and Dr. Juan Padilla, the president's physician.

Mrs. Barrios is described as a very handsome young woman, and a native of New Orleans. She and her husband left home eight years ago, when she was a young girl in her country, at New York, it was a case of love at first sight on the part of the Central American. Mrs. Barrios was then Miss Alberta Benton. She returned the love of her betrothed, and the couple were married. Mrs. Barrios took her wife to her native country, and the lady became very popular with the people. Her husband, though, was not so popular with the government of Guatemala, and he left the country, and the lady followed him very suddenly. Barrios is a soldier, and has the reputation of being a very brave and efficient officer. Never for a moment did his pluck and ambition desert him while he was in exile.

He made his home in New York, but all the time he was in communication with his friends in Guatemala, who kept him thoroughly posted on the condition of affairs.

When the time for election of President came, he was nominated and sent forward by his friends, and his nomination was received by the people with delight.

This was two and a half years ago, and the soldier thought then that the time was ripe for his return to his country. Against the advice of his

friends, who feared that Barrios would make war, with little preparation, he and his wife sailed for Guatemala. He settled in Guatemala, but he disappeared at Chiquimula. Numbers of the friends who knew them believed that Barrios and his wife were still in the city of Guatemala.

The marriage was celebrated with great ceremony, and the couple were shown along their path. Many jumped up to kiss the bride, and in the afternoon the couple were seated at a small table, and the bride was a candidate, the government's name being, I believe, Barrios, though was the name of the wife, and the bridegroom's name was not mentioned. They were seated at a small table in the highest room of the house.

## Last of the Cartels.

Holiday away in a lovely nook of the valley of the Seine, side creek, in Canada, is a pretty little house, known as Comedy House, the residence of the only surviving sister of Thomas Carlyle. It is a sweet little dwelling, and the sister, who is now 80 years of age, has had a responsible position in the service of the Great Western Railway Company of Canada.
