The Search for Water.—Yester-
day the workmen detailed to open

the springs in City Creek Cañon,

with a view to increasing the wa-
ter supply, began operations on the

one that rises in the gorge known

as Green Bushes, about three and a

half miles from the mouth of the

cañon. The spring was ditched and a flume placed, to convey the

water across the road into the main

channel. A considerable stream

was here obtained, and the success

of the operation strengthened the

hopes of Watermaster Hyde that

the plan, as a whole, would prove a

fruitful one. The laborers are

now at work a little above Green

Bushes, on other water prospects.

If the design to forward the work

energetically this summer, to the

forks of the cañon, a distance of

about seven miles from the mouth

and in the fall to continue opera-

tions in each gorge, prosecuting

the enterprise until every water re-

source in the cañon is made to yield

to its utmost capacity.

Artesian Well Machinery.—We

understand another move is being

made by the city in the matter of

obtaining artesian wells.

The Mayor, and the special committeed

appointed to aid him in the matter,

have entered into an arrangement

with Mr. Plence, of California, now

in the city, to manufacture the

necessary boring machinery at the

railroad shop.

Mr. Pierce, who is thoroughly

acquainted with the artesian well

business, from the manufacture of

the tools to the boring process, will

have a number of blacksmiths to

help him with the preliminary work.

It is estimated that the

machinery can be manufactured

here as cheaply as it could be im-

ported from the east, leaving the

advantage of applying the labor

of the miners to the work.
