

TOWN OF BURLEY FULL OF PROMISE

W. T. Jack of Cassia County, Idaho, Talks of Its Progressive Spirit.

EVERY RESIDENT A BOOSTER.

Townsite Company Making Settlement Attractive to Those Who Wish to Make Their Homes There.

"Southwestern Idaho is taking on a growth surprising alike to the inhabitants of that section, as well as to those who are watching the progress of the state," said W. T. Jack, of Burley, who arrived in this city yesterday. Mr. Jack is one of the old settlers of Cassia county, and has been interested in the growth of that particular section of Idaho for many years. He is at the head of the Burley Townsite company, which controls the site of the town of Burley, which since the advent of the railroad has become one of the active factors in the upbuilding of southwestern Idaho. "Our company proposes to assist in the upbuilding of the country by inviting settlers into our midst," said Mr. Jack, "and to this we are offering inducements for them to come. When Burley was laid out a few years ago, there was nothing but the original fertile soil in the land, covered with a thick growth of sagebrush. But the soil was there, and the energy characteristic of the people of Idaho was there, and the railroad came in to back up both. Now Burley is one of the best little towns on the Oregon Short Line, and the mass of people comprising its population are enterprising and progressive. We all want to see the town grow and prosper, which it is sure to do."

IMPROVEMENTS THIS YEAR.

"Among the improvements made upon the townsite this year is a fine modern hotel building which cost actual \$65,000 to erect. This hotel is now worth \$75,000. The railway station is a modern one, and large enough to handle the business of the country. The houses are being erected already constructed is creditable, and the best of all is that every resident of Burley is a booster, and has faith in the growth and progress of his home town."

"The situation of Burley insures its future as one of the centers of population of southwestern Idaho; it is the natural depot for supplies for Oakley, Marion, Basin, Albion, Elba, Malta and Albia; in fact, of almost the entire country of Cassia and Blaine. The grading center for the people occupying 150,000 acres of the choicest land in Idaho situated under the North and South Minidoka projects, in Cassia and Blaine counties. An electric railway is projected into Albion, which will probably be built during 1909. The Oregon Short Line, considering the advisability of building a steam line to Oakley with a fair chance of its being extended southward, and there is some probability of the plant being erected in the immediate vicinity of Burley within the near future. The soil in the vicinity of Burley and in the holdings of the townsite company, including the entire south side Minidoka and Goose Creek projects is unequalled even in Idaho; this is conceded by all who are acquainted with that section. Only the upper or southern portion of this section has been settled, owing to scarcity of water until the government commenced the construction of its south side Minidoka irrigation project which is now completed, and water is now in the three canals."

GOOSE CREEK PROJECT.

"In one year the Goose Creek project covering 50,000 acres of additional land, all of it tributary to Burley, will be completed. The Burley Townsite company has government title to the townsite and there are no incumbrances of any kind on any of its holdings. The company is holding it to be to the best interest of the town of Burley as well as to the interest of the company to dispose of its land holdings and to devote a part of the proceeds to much needed town improvements, and of the money derived from the sale hereinafter mentioned will devote the sum of \$50,000 to build a bridge across Snake river at the foot of Overland avenue; street improvements; water supply, and town hall."

"In order to accomplish this a plan has been evolved and will shortly be put in effect for the disposition of the remaining lots. It is proposed to enter into contract for the sale of these lots at \$300 each; \$150 of which is to be paid in cash at time of entering into contract; \$150 at or before time of drawing hereinafter mentioned. At the end of 90 days from the time this plan is launched, a drawing will take place at Burley, and by that time 1,500 or more of

contracts are entered into. At this drawing which will be under the control of prominent state or bank officials of Idaho and Utah, the different contracts will be numbered consecutively and the different lots will also be numbered. As the numbers of contracts are filled in their order a slip will be drawn from the box containing the number of a lot and this slip will entitle the holder of the number to a deed to such lot upon making the final payment therefor."

BIG HOTEL PRIZE.

"Upon one of the slips put into the box will be the numbers of the five lots upon which the Hotel Burley stands and the person drawing this number winning the prize without further payment or cost to a warranty deed to said lots and hotel free from all incumbrances. The hotel is constructed of Utah pressed brick, a portion being three stories in height, the main building being two stories, dimensions being 125x125 feet, and having modern heating system, and wired for electricity. Each room is provided with stationary washstand, hot and cold water; eight rooms supplied with bath. There are also three public baths. On the ground floor are six store rooms, all of which are rented for one year, occupied by Bank of Commerce; Burley Realty & Abstract company; Burley Pharmacy; Conant & Dunning, gent's furnishings; billiard hall and barber shop. The monthly rental of the building at the present time is \$470, and this amount can be increased very materially at the end of the present year. The rentals will be paid to the fortunate holder of the lucky number at the expiration of the month in which the drawing is had. Should the chances sold be less than the entire number of lots then such unsold chances will be taken and paid by the company. The company has withdrawn all lots from sale and no lots will be sold until after the drawing is had."

TWO OTHER PRIZES.

"Each contract will be consecutively numbered accordingly as it has been entered upon the books of the company and these numbers will come up and go upward, the unsold numbers being drawn by the company as herein-after provided. At the drawing the numbers from 1 to the number taken inclusive will be placed in a wheel or such other receptacle as may be thought fairest and best by the committee in charge. In another wheel or receptacle so provided will be placed the number and block of each lot including one number for the hotel and the five lots upon which it stands; one also for the Bulletin plant, including building and two lots; and one for residence and two lots on Oakley avenue. The drawing will proceed under the direction of the committee in charge by taking a slip from the receptacle containing the numbers of the drawer and a slip from the other receptacle containing the number of the lots, and the lot so drawn shall become the property of the person holding the number corresponding to the number drawn, upon such holder complying with the terms of his contract in regard to payments."

METHOD OF PAYMENT.

"Every person entering into a contract shall sign the contract in duplicate, each one of which shall be signed by the secretary of the townsite company and sealed with its seal, one contract taken by the purchaser and the other retained by the company. The purchaser may designate the bank in which the money paid by him shall be deposited, and this bank shall retain the money until the day of the drawing, on Sept. 15, 1909, and in the event that the drawing does not occur on that date, according to the condition named as to number of lots disposed of, the money shall be returned without cost to the purchaser. If the drawing takes place on the date named, then the money shall be paid to the Burley Townsite company and the provisions of the agreement shall be carried out."

"The second payment shall be made to the secretary of the townsite company on or before Sept. 14, 1909, and in case of default the purchaser loses the rights acquired by the first payment and the contract shall be cancelled. "Local agents for the townsite company will be appointed in each of the cities of Utah and Idaho, but all contracts shall be signed by the secretary of the company. The agents will not be permitted to receive first payments, but these must be made to one of the designated banks. The designated banks for receiving money for the company are as follows: Boise City National bank, the First National Bank of Idaho, of Boise, Idaho, the Deseret National bank and McCormick & Co. of Salt Lake City, Utah, and the First National Bank of Twin Falls, Idaho. "On the first day of the sale, 75 lots at Burley were disposed of, and of these 40 of your city took the first seven."

ENGINEERS MEET TONIGHT.

Will Discuss Electrical Matters of Interest to the Profession.

The Utah Society of Engineers has arranged for an especially interesting meeting this evening, in the offices of the Salt Lake & Ogden road. Features will be a talk from Leonard Wilson on the protection of transmission circuits against lightning discharges. Then there is to be a general presentation of alternating current and direct current railway operation by prominent engineers, and the salient features of each system of electric railway operation will be thoroughly described. The two lay members of the society elected to act with the officers forming the executive committee, will likely be Charles E. Moore, chief engineer United States Smelting company, and Louis S. Gates, mill manager, Boston Con. Mining company.

MALE NURSES FOR PANAMA.

Uncle Sam Announces Examinations To Secure Suitable Candidates.

Uncle Sam has hung out more want ads. This time trained male nurses in the Isthmian canal service are wanted at a salary of \$720 per annum with board and quarters, also a pathologist for Freeman's hospital, Washington, D. C., at a salary of \$2,000 per annum, and laboratory helpers for the Bureau of Chemistry, department of agriculture, at a salary of \$800 per annum. The examination for the first of these positions takes place July 8, the other two being held July 14. Yesterday an examination was held in this city under the direction of W. S. Naylor and George D. Barton, members of the local board of examiners, and secretary A. W. Williams, at which 19 young ladies and five young men appeared as candidates for clerks in the forest service. Twenty-four men took the examination for clerk carrier in connection with the local postoffice, and one candidate appeared for the position of inspector of furniture, at Chicago.

STOCKADE AND HORSE RACING

Council Committee Passes Former and Leaves Gambling to Dinny.

MORE DRINKING FOUNTAINS.

Twelve Sanitary Spouts to Alloy Thirst Of Grand Army Encampment Visitors—Water Mains Denied.

After discussing Councilman Martin's resolution to put a ban on gambling at the horse races, the municipal laws committee referred the matter to City Attorney Dinny for one of his celebrated opinions to see if under the city ordinances it could be stopped. The opinion will probably be heard from after the races have closed. In the same connection, the west side stockade came up for discussion. There was considerable fruitless talk on the subject and it was passed without anything being done. The proposition of Frank Raleigh to clear up the city's garbage under contract of \$800 a month was discussed. It will be held up until Dr. M. R. Stewart, health commissioner, returns from his eastern trip before a report will be made. The water works committee decided to recommend that twelve sanitary drinking fountains be placed on the sidewalks before the G. A. R. encampment. They will cost \$750. The committee denied the extension of water mains on Payette street from Third to Fourth West street, and on Eleventh South between Seventh and Ninth East streets. Thomas Hobday reported that the revenue from the first garbage under contract of \$800 a month would only amount to \$17 and the other would bring in \$67 a year. The council met a few minutes before committee meeting to discuss the pay roll. It amounted to \$19,768.52.

APPORTIONMENT OF FREE SCHOLARSHIPS

A. C. Nelson Completes List on Basis Of School Population.

A. C. Nelson, state superintendent of public instruction, made the apportionment of the remaining free normal scholarships yesterday for the year 1909. Fifty-six scholarships have already been awarded and the number having been increased from 200 to 400 by the last legislature, leaves 344 to be apportioned.

The school population is the basis of the apportionment. Salt Lake city has a population of 20,111 and leads with a free list of 21 scholarships. Eighth grade pupils are eligible to the first year of the Second Training school, second year high school students are eligible to the third year of the Second Training school, third year high school pupils are eligible to the fourth year of the Secondary Training school and fourth year high school students are eligible to the college department. The apportionment by school districts with the school population of each district is given in the following table:
