Gomez Closes Sensational Incident by Appointing Jose Ugarte.

WAS A VICTORY FOR ZAYAS

President Appoints Tariff Commission—Desires of Securing Concessions From the United States.

Havana, Feb. 1.—President Gomez signed a decree appointing Jose Ugarte chief of the secret police. This closes the sensational incident arising out of the proposal to appoint Ricardo Arana to that office, which was frustrated by Vice President Zayas' threat to resign.

The president has sent a message to congress in which he said that not much advance in legislation was made under the recent government of intervention, although it is true that organic laws were promulgated that merit approval.

President Gomez suggests the appointment of a commission on revision of the tariff and advocates securing the greatest concessions possible from the United States. He recommends an extensive scheme of amnesty, extending to the soldiers of the war of liberation and the revolution of 1906.

MRS. STIRLING'S DEFENSE
AGAINST HUSBAND'S CHARGES

Edinburgh, Feb. 1.—Interest in the Stirling case suits for divorce was revived today when Mrs. Stirling began her defense against her husband's charges that she had misappropriated money from the Stirling fund.

Mrs. Stirling was Clara Elizabeth Taylor, an American showgirl, before her marriage to John W. Alexander Stirling. The accused wife made a pathetic figure. Several times she was overcome with tears and her denials of the charges against her were most emphatic. She characterized many of the assertions of the husband's lawyers as villainous lies, and she replied to the allegation that she had been seen kissing Lord Northland on the stairs by saying that she was not a housemaid, she admitted that she had been indiscreet and silly, but she averred that there had been absolutely no improper relations between herself and Lord Northland.

She accused Mrs. Atherton of intrigue to throw her in company with Lord Northland so she could monopolize Mr. Stirling's fortune.

Mrs. Stirling said, among other things, that at the time of her wedding Mr. Stirling gave her \$20,000, but at the end of 1907 her husband was in financial difficulties and she handed him the entire amount back. She now had nothing.

This case throughout has been notable even among divorce cases, for its extreme outspokeness, but the women in the audience have sat through the hearings without wincing. Today, however, the question was so intimately delicate that counsel would not proceed until every woman had been cleared out of court.

NEGRO SOLDIERS.

Much Interest in Senate in Aldrich Substitute for Forsaker Bill.

Washington, Feb. 1.—When the senate met today great interest was manifested in the outcome of Senator Forsaker's efforts to have a day fixed for the consideration of the Aldrich substitute bill providing for a court of inquiry to determine which of the discharged soldiers of the Twenty-fifth regiment of infantry should be re-enlisted.

On the Democratic side there was united opposition to the passage of any measure looking to the re-enlistment of the negro soldiers. Democrats expressed the view that as recent investigations have resulted in a failure to determine the guilty men in the regiment, although it was found that men of the regiment "shot up" Brownsville, it would be manifestly impossible for any court of inquiry to act intelligently on the subject unless additional evidence could be obtained. As a consequence of the united Democratic opposition to any legislation at this session, it was evident that there would be much to be said for the full Republican vote.

On the Republican side the bill was made a party bill, and it is said it will receive their full Republican vote.

Soon after the senate met, Senator Forsaker attempted to have that body begin consideration of the substitute

Paris, Feb. 1.—Henry LeMoine, the Frenchman whose claims that he could manufacture diamonds, were recounted in the courts of Paris last summer, has been sentenced to 10 years' imprisonment in default. LeMoine fled just before the final hearing of the case against him. He was being tried on charges of having secured money from an English diamond mine owner on false pretenses by declaring that he was able to manufacture diamonds.

COINAGE FOR JANUARY.

Washington, Feb. 1.—The monthly coinage statement shows that the amount of United States coins executed at the government mints during January, 1909, was \$6,905,920, as follows: Gold, \$5,934,990; silver, \$847,600; minor coins, \$123,330.

In addition there were coined for the government of San Salvador 693,170 silver pieces and for the Philippines 1,656,000 silver pieces.

WOULD STERILIZE CRIMINALS.

Salem, Or., Feb. 1.—The senate passed by a 2 to 1 vote today the bill providing for the sterilization of the criminal insane and confirmed criminals. The definition of a confirmed criminal is any one who has served three or more terms in a penitentiary. The bill is almost a duplicate of the Indiana law.

DARWIN AND LINCOLN.

Prof. E. G. Conklin of Princeton Says Both Owed Much to Enemies.

Chicago, Feb. 2.—"Darwin and Lincoln both owed much to their enemies. Attacks made by these enemies were so saturated with venom, so filled with malice and so lacking in calm, dispassionate judgment that the simple, patient, honest greatness of these two minds, in the work of old-fashioned truth stood forth in remarkable contrast."

This tribute to the father of the theory of evolution was expressed by Prof. E. G. Conklin of Princeton university in an address last night.

"Darwin's establishment of the theory of evolution is the greatest intellectual achievement of the nineteenth century," said Prof. Conklin. "His selection of facts on the subject are the admiration of the students of the world. He overthrew the doctrine of the special creation of species."

"All men are interested in theology and politics. Fifty years ago it was difficult for men to realize that they could be descended from animal creations and yet be the sons of God."

"Darwin ranks with Sir Isaac Newton, beside whose body he lies in Westminster Abbey. His work is of lasting value. It never can be forgotten. His equal as a scientist can never be expected of the future."

NEVADA CENSURES PREST. ROOSEVELT

Resolution Introduced in Legislature Condemning His Conduct Towards California.

HOLDS IS NO DANGER OF WAR

But It Must Come With Japan Now is Best Time to Lay Down Terms to Her.

Carson, Nev., Feb. 1.—A resolution was introduced in the assembly of the Nevada legislature this afternoon, and which it is believed will be passed. It is anti-Japanese in every particular. After acknowledging the fact that the Japanese are acquiring lands and property in this and other states, the resolution says:

"The president has seen fit to take advantage of his high office to the extent of attempting to coerce and intimidate legislation in California upon this subject, and whereas we view with alarm this attempted encroachment of the government on states' rights; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That we, the people of the state of Nevada, represented in senate and assembly, do hereby recommend to the state of California to pay no attention whatever to the admonishing of the president in this particular, but to go ahead and enact such stringent measures as will absolutely stop forthwith the encroachment of the Japanese and the further acquiring of foothold in this nation; and, be it further

"Resolved, That we believe there is no danger of war with the Japanese, as is advanced by those who oppose our views, but we believe that if we must have war with the Japanese empire sooner or later, now is a better time to lay down terms to that empire and teach those arrogant people that American rights cannot be encroached upon, and they cannot or never will be, allowed or given an opportunity to acquire foothold in this country, or to assimilate with our race, and we further censure Theodore Roosevelt, president of the United States, for his uncalled for interference in attempting to deprive the citizens of the great commonwealth of California by threats and coercion from encroaching their lawful rights of protecting themselves from the Japanese hordes; and, be it further

"Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to our representatives in Congress, urging an exclusion act against the Japanese and Chinese which will perpetually exclude them from coming into this country."

DECREE DISSOLVING

AMERICAN GUARANTY CO.

Chicago, Feb. 2.—The Tribune today prints the following news article from Charleston, W. Va., under date of Feb. 1:

A decree for the dissolution of the American Guaranty company of Chicago was entered by the circuit court of Kanawha county this afternoon on the presentation of a bill by Atty. H. C. Bangs.

H. L. Banker, was appointed the receiver in dissolution.

This decision puts an end to the negotiations between the stockholders of Charles La Tour Pury and the surviving officers and directors of the company which have been pending in Chicago for several weeks.

The bill declares that the expert knowledge of Charles La Tour Pury had increased the business from \$3,000,000 worth of contracts to \$15,000,000 before his death. It states that his wife and daughter, being unable to agree with the other stockholders on a suitable successor as manager of the company and being unable for lack of experience and qualification to undertake control of the business themselves, concluded to ask that the company should be dissolved, its business wound up and its assets liquidated and distributed.

PREHISTORIC MAN

OF GIGANTIC SIZE

New York, Feb. 2.—The skeleton of a prehistoric man of gigantic size has been found at a town ten miles southeast of the City of Mexico, according to news received here yesterday. Results in Clayton Smith Shooting His Father-in-Law.

La Grande, Or., Feb. 2.—As the result of a family quarrel at Union, 13 miles from here, Clayton Smith, aged 19, shot, and it is believed mortally wounded his father-in-law, F. P. Laurie, aged 55.

The two had quarrelled, it is announced, intermittently for a year and a half, ever since Smith married Laurie's daughter, against the father's wishes. Yesterday an extremely bitter word battle ensued. Both men lost their temper, the older man drawing a knife, it is understood. This was followed, it is said, by the shooting on the part of the younger man. Smith was arrested and is now in the city jail awaiting the arrival of the sheriff from here to bring the prisoners to the county jail in this city.
