CITY'S GARBAGE.

Proposition for Railroads to Haul Refuse is Knocked Out.

The proposition of hauling the city's garbage to the sewer farm over the spur track which now runs to the old stock yards as agreed upon between stock yards as agreed upon between the sanitary committee of the city council and the Oregon Short Line railroad representatives was knocked out in about two minutes at the com-initea meeting on Saturday by the statement of General Supt. Welby of the Rio Grande Western to the effect that the new stock yards would em-brace a great portion of the land upon which the spur track new stands and hence the track would have to be taken up.
