Those Convicted of Signing Viborg Manifesto Will Carry Case to the Senate.

LIGHT SENTENCE A SURPRISE.

Ex-Deputies Take Verdiet Philosoph. ically-The Slovo Declares Trial A Political Mistake.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 1 .- The case of the members of the first douma who ere convicted yesterday for signing the Viborg manifesto and sentenced months' imprisonment, will be carried before the senate, the highest tribunal in Russia. The defendants held a meeting today and passed vote of warm appreciation for the brilliant services of counsel for the de-

The main argument before the senate will be made by M. Teslenko-a leader of the Moscow bar who has borne the brufit of the present trial and the gov. emment, which is dissatisfied with the conduct of the trial, will be repre-sented by the minister of justice in

The verdict and the light sentences three months' imprisonment came as a pleasant surprise to the defend-ants and the public, as it had been feared that the admission of joint responsibility by all the ex-deputies in the dissemination of the manifesto ed a sentence to incarceration for ne or two years. The verdict did not ontain any reference to the loss of political rights, but such loss inevit-ably follows, according to the senate's terpretation of the electoral law. esty to re-endow the franchise, and he only salvation of the convicted men lies in a complete revision of the electoral law by the third douma.

The former deputies are taking the verdict philosophically. They point out that its practical results are of no mportance, as they tasted punishment advance, having been excluded from elections to the second and third doums and systematically expelled from state, zemtsvo, and municipal employment. The probability is that the third doums will be long lived and next executive elections will not be held until 1912, and it is gen-erally supposed that by then times will have changed and the electoral

w have been revised. Though the ex-deputies declare that heir being deprived of political rights s the maximum of misfortune for pub-lc spirited citizens, the general feelng among them is of satisfaction with the progress of the trial. The Liberal press hails the verdict as the fall of the curtain on the last act of the drama f the first douma, which they say asses into history without dishonor. The Slovo calls the Viborg trial a po-This mistake, it declares, consists first, in bringing the case to trial and thereby assisting in the resurrecon of the first douma, which left the purtroom a moral victor, and second, banishing 167 former deputies from n banishing 10. former deputies from political life, a measure of unparal-eled severity which is sure to be dis-approved by public opinion abroad. SEABOARD AIR LINE RAILROAD TROUBLES.

Richmond. Va., Jan. 1.—Counsel for the Seaboard Air Line Railroad company and creditors of the company applied this afternoon to United States District Judge Waddell for the appointment of receivers and subsequently agreed to make application to Judge Pritchard of the United States circuit court and threby obviate the necessity of securing an ancillary decree through which the lines of the company operate. With this end in view, Judge Leigh R. Watts, general counsel of the Seaboard, with other altorneys, left for Danville at \$:50 octook on a special train to meet Judge Pritchard at that point, it having been learned that he was on his way to Richmond to consider the matter tomorrow. Judge Waddell announced that he would appoint the receivers on certain conditions, but it was thought best to go to a court with larger jurisdiction.

Boston, Jan. 11.—A call for a meeting of colored citizens, to be held at Philadelphia on April 7, was sent cut today to representative colored men over the country by Rev. W. H. Scott, president of the Suffrage League of Boston and vicinity; Bishop Alexander Walters, president of the National Afro-American council, and William Monroe Trotter, president of the New England Constitution and Suffrage league.

The call says the conference is to have special refrence to demands to be made of political parties as to platforms for the next presidential election and to determine what candidates for the presidency most deserve the support of the colored voters.

JAPAN BUYING UP ALL AVAILABLE SALTPETRE

San Francisco, Jan. 1.—Passengers who arrived by the Kosmos liner No-ko today, and officers of the steamer, bring news of great Japanese activity at the port of Iquique, in Chile. They say that the Japanese government is buying up all the saltpetre available in Chile, and also that great stocks of "yucca," which grows in great profusion in the Sahama district, near Iquique, are being sent by every steamer to Japan. A line of fast steamers of about 6,000 tons register has been put on between Japan and Iquique, and, according to reports heard at ports along the cast, these steamers are taking full cargoes of saltpetre and yucca on every trip.

All except 14 of those present were unemployed laborers from other cities, and many of them had not even the price of one night's lodging.

DEFENSE OF PACIFIC COAST

Adit.-Gens. of Three Coast States Invited to Washington by War Department.

REQUEST VERY SIGNIFICANT.

To Prepare for Any Emergencles That May Arise.

Portland, Or., Jan. 1,-The Oregonian will say tomorrow the adjutants-general of the three Pacific coast states have been invited by the war department to go to Washington, D. C., for a conference at the earliest possible date on the subject of coast defense. Adjt.-Gen. W. E. Finzer of Oregon, and Gen. J. M. Lauck of California will leave for Washington tomorrow and Gen. Otis Hamilton of Washington will start east Saturday.

The request from the war department for this conference is regarded here as peculiarly significant, indicating that the government intends to prepare for any emergencies that may arise. The principal topic of consideration at the conference will be the eration at the conference will be the training volunteer coast artillery to man Oregon, Washington and California forthcations. The subject of perfecting the infantry regiments of the three states in coast defense operations will likewise be taken up. It is assumed that the meeting will result in the assignment of national guard troops to coast artillery work.

The three adjutants-general will very likely return with the task of recruiting new coast companies for this service. It is understood that coast officers alone are included in the conference, which is a fact significant of the government's attitude concerning the possible need of defending the west shore at some future date.
