

DOUMA MEMBERS WILL MAKE APPEAL
Those Convicted of Signing Viborg Manifesto Will Carry Case to the Senate.
LIGHT SENTENCE A SURPRISE.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 1.—The case of the members of the first douma who were convicted yesterday for signing the Viborg manifesto and sentenced to three months' imprisonment, will be carried before the senate, the highest tribunal in Russia. The defendants held a meeting today and passed a vote of warm appreciation for the brilliant services of counsel for the defense.

The main argument before the senate will be made by M. Teslenko—a leader of the Moscow bar who has borne the brunt of the present trial and the government, which is dissatisfied with the conduct of the trial, will be represented by the minister of justice in person.

The verdict and the light sentences of three months' imprisonment came as a pleasant surprise to the defendants and the public, as it had been feared that the admission of joint responsibility by all the ex-deputies in the dissolution of the manifesto would result in a sentence to incarceration for one or two years. The verdict did not contain any reference to the loss of political rights, but such loss inevitably follows, according to the senate's interpretation of the electoral law.

The former deputies are taking the verdict philosophically. They point out that its practical results are of no importance, as they tasted punishment in advance, having been excluded from the elections to the second and third dumas and systematically expelled from state, zemstvo, and municipal employment. The probability is that the third douma will be long lived and that the next executive elections will not be held until 1912, and it is generally supposed that by then times will have changed and the electoral law have been revised.

Though the ex-deputies declare that they are not despondent, they are nevertheless in the maximum of misfortune for public spirited citizens, the general feeling among them is of satisfaction with the progress of the trial. The liberal press hails the verdict as the fall of the curtain on the last act of the drama of the first douma, which they say passes into history without dishonor.

The St. Petersburg trial is a political mistake of the Russian bureaucracy. This mistake, it declares, consists first, in bringing the case to trial and thereby assisting in the resurrection of the first douma, which left the courtroom a moral victor, and second, in banishing 167 former deputies from political life, a measure of unparalleled severity which is sure to be disapproved by public opinion.

The Russ enumerates the judicial irregularities of the case and the embarrassment of the court to frame a legal formula on which to base condemnation. It argues that the wisest course for the government would have been to assign the Viborg manifesto to history without prosecuting its authors.

gauge and collateral 5 per cent bonds, all due that month, to May, 1908. The company has outstanding \$23,896,000 of preferred stock and \$7,000,000 of common stock. On June 29, 1906, the road had a funded debt of \$63,000,000. It owns 2,382 miles of road, and a total of owned and operated lines of 2,811 miles. The main line extends from Richmond, Va., and Portsmouth, Va., to Tampa, Fla., in the numerous branches. It was organized under its present corporate title in 1910. Some time later, a holding concern, the Seaboard company, was formed with \$72,000,000 capital to manage the securities of the system.

The Seaboard was in the thick of the southern war. It at first refused to submit to the 2-cent rate fixed by several of the southern states, last August. J. M. Bart, former president of the road, declared under oath at the federal inquiry in this city that the rate was confiscatory. The road finally submitted to the rate. The government recently took steps to prosecute the Seaboard for being in the alleged bituminous combine.

It was stated tonight that there would be no default in interest on the 5 per cent bond coupons which fell due on New Year's, arrangements having been made with the New York bankers to advance the funds.

CALL FOR NEGRO MEETINGS.
Boston, Jan. 11.—A call for a meeting of colored citizens, to be held at Philadelphia on April 7, was sent out today to representative colored men over the country by Rev. W. H. Scott, president of the Suffrage League of Boston and vicinity; Bishop Alexander Walters, president of the National Afro-American council; and William Monroe Trotter, president of the New England Constitution and Suffrage League.

The call says the conference is to have special reference to demands to be made of political parties as to platforms for the next presidential election and to determine what candidates for the presidency most deserve the support of the colored voters.

GRAND TRUNK WRECK.
Barie, Ont., Jan. 1.—The southbound Penatung express on the Grand Trunk railway was derailed about seven miles north of here tonight and rolled down a 46-foot embankment. A stove in the second car set fire to the train and it burned. All of the passengers of whom 15 were injured, were taken out safely. The injured were brought to hospital here, where it is understood their injuries are not serious.

MURDERER PARDONED.
Denver, Jan. 1.—In commemoration of the emancipation proclamation of President Lincoln, which became effective 40 years ago, Gov. Henry A. Fischer today pardoned from the state penitentiary Edward Freeman, a negro, who had served five years of a 10 to 20 years term for murder committed at Trinidad.

JAPAN BUYING UP ALL AVAILABLE SALTPETRE
San Francisco, Jan. 1.—Passengers who arrived by the Kosmos liner Neko today, and officers of the steamer, bring news of great Japanese activity in Chile. They say that the Japanese government is buying up all the saltpetre available in Chile, and also that great stocks of "yuca," which grows in great quantities in the Sabama district, near Iquique, are being sent by every steamer to Japan. A line of 14 steamers of about 6,000 tons register has been put on between Japan and Yucatan as a steady form of palm with a resinous grass growing in the sea, the product of which contains a large percentage of plicic acid, and its sole use is for the manufacture of smoke powder, the high explosive which was used with deadly effect in the recent war with Russia.

THE POOR GIVE THEIR LAST CENT FOR THE POOR.
Chicago, Jan. 2.—A pitiful scene was enacted at the Pacific Garden mission yesterday when homeless, unemployed men contributed from their scant funds to aid more unfortunate than themselves.

DEFENSE OF PACIFIC COAST
Adjt.-Gens. of Three Coast States Invited to Washington by War Department.

REQUEST VERY SIGNIFICANT.
Taken to Mean Government Intends to Prepare for Any Emergencies That May Arise.

Portland, Or., Jan. 1.—The Oregonian will say tomorrow the adjutant-general of the three Pacific coast states have been invited by the war department to go to Washington, D. C., for a conference at the earliest possible date on the subject of coast defense. Adjt.-Gen. W. E. Finzer of Oregon, and Gen. J. M. Lauck of California will leave for Washington tomorrow and Gen. Otis Hamilton of Washington will start east Saturday.

The request from the war department for this conference is regarded here as peculiarly significant, indicating that the government intends to prepare for any emergencies that may arise. The principal topic of consideration at the conference will be the training volunteer coast artillery to man Oregon, Washington and California fortifications. The subject of perfecting the infantry regiments of the three states in coast defense operations will likewise be taken up. It is assumed that the meeting will result in the assignment of national guard troops to coast artillery units.

The three adjutant-generals will very likely return with the task of recruiting new coast companies for this service. It is understood that coast officers alone are included in the conference, which is a fact significant of the government's attitude concerning the possible need of defending the west shore at some future date. Acting Secy. of War Oliver transmitted the request for the conference.

LONG RECORD OF KILLINGS, ASSAULTS AND MINOR CRIMES.
New York, Jan. 1.—A long record of killings, assaults, accidents and minor crimes was written in Brooklyn police blotters today. New Year's day in usually peaceful Brooklyn was even more disturbed than in larger Manhattan. The police had scores of assault cases to handle in both boroughs.

Gas escaping from a partly open burner asphyxiated Jacob Spiesterbach and his wife in their home in Ocean Parkway, Brooklyn.

An unknown burglar was shot down and killed while trying to enter David Jaffe's store on Meserole street. Jaffe collapsed when he found he had killed the burglar.

The police are hunting for Frank Ferrero, who shot and killed Michael Schindello as an outcome of an altercation in Carroll street.

Hattie Schubert took umbrage at a remark made by her husband, Max Schubert, in their home on Ocean Parkway, and stabbed him with a knife. He is in a serious condition.

After a quarrel with his wife as to the manner of celebrating New Year's Archibald P. Mitchell, who several years ago married Augusta Horne, a daughter of a wealthy West Virginia politician, took his life early today by inhaling illuminating gas at his home on Seventy-first street, Manhattan.

DR. HILPRECHT REFUSES TO REOPEN CONTROVERSY
Philadelphia, Jan. 1.—Dr. Herman V. Hilprecht, the noted Assyriologist whose standing as a scholar and author has been questioned and who was yesterday asked by the Society of Biblical Literature and Exegesis to make a reply to charges affecting his discoveries in Nipper, has issued a statement in which he says he will refuse to open the controversy. He says: "I have read in the newspapers the resolution presented yesterday at the afternoon session of the Society of Biblical Literature and Exegesis. 'My reply to the charges preferred against me by Dr. John P. Peters was made to his own chosen tribunal, the trustees of the University of Pennsylvania, the only American institution whose organization I recognize as officially entitled to demand it. If societies or individuals are dissatisfied with the report of 1905, or to the extent to which publicity has been given to the proceedings then conducted, they must not look to me at this time for a public review or revival of the controversy.'"
