

THE PRESIDENT

IS OPERATED ON

Was an Abscess on Leg Injured at
Pittsfield, Mass.

BONE SLIGHTLY AFFECTED.

Doctors Unwilling to be Quoted, but
State There is No Cause What-
ever for Alarm.

Washington, Sept. 28.—Another operation was performed today on the abscess on the left leg of President Roosevelt. In the former operation a simple needle was used to relieve the trouble, but today the surgeons, with a knife, made an incision into the small cavity, exposing the bone, which was found to be slightly affected. The president's case has been progressing satisfactorily, but it is believed by the physicians that the further operation made today will hasten his complete recovery.

While none of the doctors are willing to be quoted, they gave the most positive assurances that there is not the least cause for alarm, and say that on the contrary there is every indication of a speedy recovery; that the area of bone affected is very slight, and will not result in any impairment of the president's limb, and that there is no evidence whatever of any matter that would produce blood poisoning. They confidently express their opinion that the president will be up in a reasonably short time and that owing to his robust constitution will soon be himself.

Dr. Newton of New York, who has been acquainted with the Roosevelt family and attended the president's children at various times and who is also a well known bone specialist, joined the president's physicians in their consultation at 10 o'clock. It was noticed that there had been a slight rise in the president's temperature and an increase in local symptoms and the conclusion was reached that the patient's recovery would be hastened by making an incision of the wound for the purpose of relieving the slight tension of swelling which was present and also to drain the wound.

The operation was performed between 2 and 3 o'clock in the afternoon and application of cocaine was used to allay the pain. The president stood the operation very well and subsequently expressed his satisfaction at the successful result.

Dr. Rixey, the surgeon-general of the navy, performed the operation, assisted by Dr. Long, the president's regular physician. Dr. O'Reilly, who also was present with the other physicians, is a assistant-surgeon-general of the army, and he was consulted regarding the case. Dr. Edward R. Stitt, another of those present, is in charge of the naval museum of hygiene and medical school.

The physicians tonight took a rosate view of the president's prospects for getting out again. He has become somewhat restive because of his close confinement and the physicians are considering the advisability of permitting him to take a ride in a few days. The physicians say the question now is one of the healing of the wound and reiterating that this will be hastened by the operation made today.

WAS NOT UNEXPECTED.

Indianapolis, Sept. 28.—The Indianapolis physicians and surgeons who participated in the operation performed on the president at St. Vincent's hospital last Tuesday, were shown the dispatch from Washington announcing that another operation had been necessary, and all declared that this was not unexpected, but was what they had feared. All united, however, in saying that there is no danger in such an operation either from blood poisoning or in regard to the permanent impairment of the limb.

Dr. John H. Oliver, who performed the first operation, said: "The new operation is only what we all feared would be necessary and why we advised that he be hurried back to Washington. The wound is by no means dangerous, although it is of such a nature as to require that he give up the use of his limb for some time. There is absolutely no danger that the limb will have to be amputated or from blood poisoning either."

Dr. Henry Jackson said: "That another operation would have to be performed is only about what we expected. The serum was collected in the cavity under the perforation from which it was drained. What has happened is only what we feared and why we advised absolute quiet for the limb. There is nothing serious except that it may cause a very sore leg and would necessarily require that it be opened and the serum drained. It may even be necessary to scrape the bone, but time will show this. There is no danger that the limb will have to be amputated and, with proper drainage, neither is there any cause for alarm in regard to blood poisoning."

Dr. Cook made the following statement: "I am not surprised to learn that the cavity has become affected and that the bone has been found to be diseased. That probability was discussed prior to the operation."

Demonstration Against Railroad.

Saratoga, N. Y., Sept. 28.—Violent demonstrations against the Hudson Valley Railroad company have caused the train to be exchanged. Trouble broke out late last night when attempts were made to burn the bridges between this place and Halston. Obstacles were placed on the tracks and the passengers, who numbered about a dozen, sought to ground the trolley wires. A force of detectives hurried to the point and shots were exchanged. The two men alleged to have been engaged in the depredations were arrested.
