LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Blain, not Blair.—The postmaster recently appointed for Spring City, Sanpete County, is Robert Blain, instead of Robert Blair.

Encouraging.—Coal is reported obtainable at Kimball's, on the line of the Utah Eastern, at \$4 per ton. Efforts are being made to push the branch track from that point to the summit, which will bring the coal depot still nearer to this city.

In Town.—Bishop Cutler, of Lehi, is in town. He came up last night.

Mrs. Robert S. Campbell and Mrs. John T. Cane, Jr., of Logan, are also here to spend the holidays. The ladies are expecting their husbands down in a few days.

Dr. O. C. Ormsby, of Logan, came down this morning, and returned home this afternoon.

Salt Lake Ahead.—The shooting match yesterday, the result of which was the salt round, was a tie, as stated last evening, terminated in favor of the Salt Lake team, by one bird. The score at the close of the 10th round stood 57 to 56. At the conclusion of the match, Mr. Beardsley, of Ogden, started his carrier pigeon to that town with the news.

Santa Claus Agent.—For weeks past our enterprising newsdealer, book-seller, and proprietor of the biggest toy establishment in the Territory, James Dwyer, has been busily engaged in receiving goods for the holiday, and is now preparing for his annual grand opening. James is one of the authorized agents for Santa Claus & Co., general dealers in all that's nice and lovely, and may always be found at his place of business.

Two Men Killed.—A dispatch from the mayor of Mantí, Sanpete County, to Superintendent John Sharp, states that two men, of 30 who went from Mantí to work on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad, have been killed by a cave. The telegram asks the cost of transporting their bodies from the terminus home, for burial. No names or particulars given.

Superintendent Sharp, on receiving the dispatch, informed the mayor that the cost for each body would be \$120, but afterwards telegraphed to Omaha and got a reduction in the rates, so that both bodies will be transported by express to York at the usual passenger fare for one.

The Co-op Window.—One of the finest show windows in the city, unequalled in the extent and variety of its wares, and barely surpassed in taste and magnificence by one described in another item, is the Z. C. M. I. grocery window, tricked out for the holidays by Mr. George Manu-waring, a clerk in that extensive establishment. All kinds of candies, nuts, fruits, bottled and canned goods and the finest of groceries, are to be seen there, arranged in beautiful shapes and tiers, one above another, from the base of the window to the very ceiling. It is estimated that at least \$1,000 worth of goods is displayed there. George is an adept at the art of window dressing, and has succeeded this time beyond all previous efforts. The show is worthy of the establishment which it adorns.

Davis' Window.—Mr. George W. Davis, the popular grocer, has opened his holiday window. It is simply magnificent. It beats all that has yet been done in this line, and we believe will stand ahead of any similar display to be made here this winter. Everything is new and everything gorgeous. The fine new window is dressed out in a style worthy of itself, and is truly a splendid spectacle, reminding one of the richness and magnificence of a Pagan temple, or the faded splendors seen by Aladdin in the subterranean gardens of the genii of the orient. Such a sight could not have been presented except by hard labor and much expense. For weeks the material for the display has been in preparation by Mr. Davis and his assistants, and three whole days have been spent on the window alone. Mr. Davis, who has designed and directed the work, has fairly eclipsed himself, and is the worthy subject of continuous congratulations for his success, from all who have taken a glance at his Christmas window. To particularize would be to cheapen. Go and see it for yourself.

From the Southern States.—Elder Levi P. Helm, of Mill Creek, who returned from a mission to the Southern States on the 15th inst., called in to-day. It is 18 months to date, since he left home for Virginia, where he labored for about seven months, meeting with gratifying success, in company with three of his fellow missionaries. They baptized 50 persons during the time. Elder Helm remained in that region, from which he removed to go to the State of Kentucky on the 20th of last January. He staid there until released on the 23d of last November, met with good treatment generally, and baptized one person in Muhlenburg County. In his travels he found the gospel tracts, by Elder John Morgan, of great help in the dissemination of the gospel. More preaching, he says, can be done with them, than with two elders. He left Kentucky on the 28th of November, and visited relatives in Sandusky County, Ohio, by whom he was treated with kindness and consideration. Remained there about two weeks and then left for home. In Chicago he met Bishop Jacob Weiler and wife, of this city, who were also on their return to Utah. They remained in Council Bluffs, expecting to visit there a couple of days and then to come directly home. Elder Helm enjoyed his mission first rate, returns in excellent health, and is delighted to be in the midst of the Saints once more.

Telephonic Communication.—At last Salt Lake is to have the telephone. The project has been talked of extensively heretofore, but the first practical move is now being made. In this respect our city has emulated the example of the blind poet: "long choosing and late to begin." Still, late is better than never, and the convenience and benefits of the telephone exchange are not limited to any particular period of time. It will be as fully appreciated now as it ever could have been, especially while walking is so bad and street-sweepers a rarity in creation. The Telephone Company will be known as A. J. Pattison & Co., and to-morrow agents will begin canvassing the town for subscriptions to the new enterprise. The office where all the wires will centre, is the Western Union Telegraph a few doors north of the Deseret Bank, and from thence separate wires will connect with the residence, offices and places of business of most of the subscribers. Others will own wires conjointly. The system will include the City Hall, Fire Department, Post Office, railroad offices, leading physicians' offices and other places, and will doubtless be patronized by all the principal banks, business houses and other establishments. A subscriber who has a separate wire can communicate privately with a friend at any time and in any part of town to which it extends, the required connections being made at the central office, which will be open day and night, as per order transmitted by wire to the clerk in charge. The plan will expedite business, save time and shoe leather, and leave the muddy streets comparatively free for the use of loafers and business men. Seriously, however, the advantages of the system are self-evident, and we look to see it widely adopted. Those wishing to rent telephones may leave orders at the Deseret Bank. As soon as the system is in operation, we will give a further description of its workings.

Street Crossings.—A "Lover of Cleanliness" writes as follows to the editor of the News:

Sir—Is there no one in authority to whom the public could apply, that would not appoint some one to sweep, or rather rake the pools of mud off the crossings of our beloved city? I believe many of our poor boys would be ready to do it, being paid suitably through the stores or in any way judged most judicious. And surely few passers-by, women especially, to whom the present state of the crossings is a special nuisance would fail to slide a small coin into the hand of so public a benefactor. I do think the present state of the crossings is a reflection upon the citizens. I am concerned for their honor, and also for the comfort of the community. I trust this hint will be sufficient.

Much Better.—We are pleased to learn, by postal card from Logan to Brother Milando Pratt, cousin of Brother Frank Merrill, who was seriously hurt at that place on Sunday morning last, that the injured man is in a fair way towards recovery. Dr. Ormsby gave him up on Wednesday, but about 4 p. m. on that day he changed for the better. When his relatives, from this city, with Dr. Benedict, arrived there on Wednesday night, the physician considered that with care Brother Merrill would get well.

Jacob D. Burnham.—In response to an inquiry, in this paper for Jacob D. Burnham, a native of Connecticut, Mr. Benjamin T. Blanchard, of Springfield, a brother to Mr. Burnham's wife, writes on the 16th inst. as follows: "He (Burnham) came to Nauvoo, and then to Florence, where his wife died; in the Spring of 1847 he went with the Pioneers to Salt Lake Valley, and in the year 1849 went to the mines in California and died in 1850. Any further information that is wanted I will try and furnish. Address Springfield, Utah."

Eight More.—Eight more indictments were brought in by the Grand Jury this morning. One under the laws of the United States, and the others under the laws of the Territory.

The Jury are working almost incessantly and have done some fast work since they began, less than two weeks ago. They have returned 28 indictments in all, and their labors are drawing to a close.

At Boise.—Hons. William Budge, Jas. H. Hart and Jos. C. Rich, members of the Idaho Legislature from Bear Lake County, arrived at Boise City on last Saturday night, after a tiresome trip of three days by coach from Kelton. Worn out from want of sleep, but otherwise well.

The Dorseys.—The Dorsey Brothers (colored) Frank and Samuel, for grand larceny, were this morning each sentenced to one year in the Utah Penitentiary. In two other cases, in which they are defendants, the sentence was suspended.
