NEEDS THE NOTICE. California Varsity President Keeps Name Before Public.

Name Before Public.

Berkeley, Cal., April 2.—The modifications in the American football rules adopted by the eastern rules committee will have no effect on the game in California. The conference committees of the Stanford and California universities will not recede from their decision substituting Rugby for the American game. President Wheeler of the University of California this afternoon gave out the following statement to the press:

"The rules finally adopted for the new American intercollegiate football game are. I see, essentially those worked out at the two previous meetings of the rules committee, There can be no doubt that these rules will effect a very radical change in the game, but exactly what that change will be I think no one at he present time can foresee. Nothing short of one entire season's experience can for instance, determine how the new ten-yard rule will operate. The rule is intended to diminish line bucking, but there are some experts who prophesy that the very fear of end runs will cause the defense to so strengthen the ends of the line as to weaken the center, and so after all give enhanced temptation to bucking, I should myself think that bucking would be thereby discouraged, and that something will take its place, but I do not know what this will be.
