Correspondence Between Cleveland and Blanton Dossan.

LETTERS BEFORE THE ELECTIONS.

A Supposed Tact Pledge that the President Would Sign a Free Coinage Bill.

DESERET, Colo., July 12.—The Rocky Mountain News has published from correspondence between Grover Cleveland and Blanton Dossan, a Cleveland letter, it is alleged, which is directed to secure the support of California at the last election. The letter states that he would approve the bill for the free coinage of the American silver dollar.

Upon June 24, 1892, Dossan wrote a letter in which he stated that Cleveland's influence has been too much for him. The distinction that he has made is an indication of fear upon his part that the unlimited coinage of the silver of the world would produce disaster and calamity upon our commercial interests. That he would willingly sign a bill providing for the free coinage of silver from our own mines I am perfectly convinced.

The letter was sent to both Cleveland and Dossan before its publication. It was written very shortly after their nomination and extensively criticized. After writing the letter Dossan informed Cleveland that he would secure the electoral vote for him by getting editorial articles into the chief papers of California to commend him along that line. He also included clippings from the Los Angeles Times commending him to the voters of California because of his friendship for silver.

On the 15th of July, 1892, Cleveland wrote to Dossan as follows: "I received your letter of June 15th, recommending me for the Los Angeles Times. I thank you for both. I am glad to know that you are working to the line you indicate in your letter, and I have not the slightest doubt that your great good will will be the result."

Dossan writes: "Cleveland's letter was a tact pledge to me that I had stated his views correctly. No other construction can be placed upon it, and I do not believe that he intended to do so. He had no right to do so as he was carrying out an action which was to give him and the people voluntary services without the expectation of reward for payment and reward on any part. Dossan thanked me heartily and I do not doubt that his action will be when he is asked to save them from destruction."

THE SILVER PURCHASE CLAUSE.
A New Construction Put Upon It by the Department.

WASHINGTON, July 12.—It is understood that the treasury department holds that it is not required by the Sherman law to purchase 4,500,000 ounces of silver each month. The law reads: "That the secretary of the treasury is hereby directed to purchase from time to time, after the date of the act, of 4,500,000 ounces of silver, so much thereof as may be required at such monthly, at the market price thereof."

Under this construction, if the price does not suit the department, it is held that the purchases need not be made in any month, so long as the aggregate is maintained. London, July 12.—The House went into committee of the whole on the Home rule bill.
