## Last Hours and Obsequies of the late Elder Caleb Parry.

The *Millennial Star*, of the 26th ult., contains the following communication:26, Tenby St., Birmingham.  
Sept. 23, 1871.

President Albert Carrington.

Dear Brother—President Caleb Parry's funeral was appointed at 1 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 22. The hearse and mourning coach were preceded by the cemetery officer in uniform, and the six pall-bearers; Elder William A. Willis, Pres. of the Hockley Branch, and his first counselor Thomas Hooper, and four other brethren, and followed by a goodly number of the Saints; in the mourning carriage were Elder R. J. Filce, sister Timms and her daughter Damaris, sister Wedge, of Dudley, who had been very kind to Pres. Parry during his sickness, and Elder Samuel P. Jarvis, officiating Elder.

At the cemetery chapel, the hymn, "Mourn not the dead," was sung, appropriate remarks were made by Elder Jarvis, and prayer offered, when the procession proceeded to the grave, 152, Section D., Birmingham old cemetery, which was dug down to Elder Flanigan's coffin, a distance of seven feet. "Now he's gone, we'll not recall him," was sung, appropriate remarks were made by Elder Jarvis, prayer offered and the Saints took a last farewell of the remains of one who had gained the love and esteem of all who had made his acquaintance.

On Sunday night, Sept. 10, 1871, President Caleb Parry felt impressed that he was on his death bed, and when we were all in the room he asked to be raised up that he might say a few words while his speech yet remained, for they might be the last words he would be able to utter in this probation, so as to be distinctly understood. I took paper and pencil and wrote as he spoke as follows—

"I wish Elder Richard J. Filce to tell President Carrington that I do not feel that I have done a great work here, but I have done all I could do in my humble way. I have always vindicated the truth and the character of the servants of God; and, whenever I did so I always felt the power of God upon me. I never failed to enjoy the Spirit whenever I bore testimony to the purity of their lives. I wish to be kindly remembered to my brethren and sisters according to the flesh, and to their families, and to Joseph my cousin.

"I wish sister Timms to write to my wife and inform her that I have received here all the attention and comfort that my heart could desire, and, if possible, more than I could have received anywhere else.

"I wish to be kindly remembered to those Saints who are acquainted with me in Abersychan, Rhymney, Swansea and Cardiff; also to sister Scott and brother Villier and Son, of Commercial Road, Newport, Monmouthshire."

In addition he instructed brother Filce in regard to his family, and on business matters.

I venture to add that, during our short acquaintance with Elder Caleb Parry in Birmingham, he always conducted himself as a refined gentleman, and a good counselor and father to the Saints, and seemed highly respected wherever he went.
