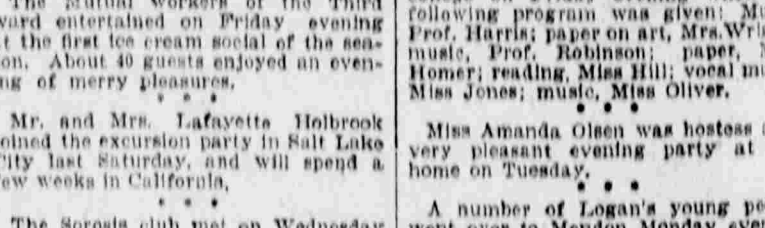
**LOGAN.**
