Last Night's Dispatches.

EASTERN.
At Pittsburgh.
PITTSBURGH, 25.—President Grant and party arrived here this afternoon by a special train from Cleveland; they leave for Washington to-morrow morning.

Steamer Burned.
BATON ROUGE, La., 22.—The steamboat *Esparanza* was burned at Port of the Island, last night, with a cargo, the captain and crew being the only persons missing.

Accepted.
WASHINGTON, 23.—Maj. G. H. Chamberlain, U. S. Marshal at Atlanta, Ga., has been offered and accepted the position of chief of the southern branch of the secret service department.

Meeting on Board the "Tokio."
NEW YORK, 22.—At a meeting in the steamer *Tokio*, to-day, Mr. A. A. Low said this ship showed that it was not for the want of man, but for the want of money that the United States had lost her prestige on the ocean; we paid other nations for carrying our goods because government refused to back up our steamers with subsidies as England had done. He hoped when these vessels returned to the Pacific that our government would be found equal to the maintenance of our flag.

After Hostile Indians.
A special to the World from General Miles' expedition, Captain Chaffee's command, 25 miles S. E. of Camp Supply, Cal., says: A decided advantage has been gained within the past four days over a band of hostile Indians, led by "Red Otter." For some time previous to the 17th inst. Captain Chaffee, with the sixth regiment of cavalry of General Miles' command, had been in pursuit of this party, and on the date mentioned came unexpectedly upon them before they could make preparations for flight. The Indians, consisting of ten, horses, saddles, blankets, etc. The Indians were greatly demoralized by the attack and fled in a southerly direction toward their agency, in the south-west corner of Indian territory, about 50 miles from the mouth of the Washita River and the north fork of the Red River. The pursuit of the fleeing Indians was kept up by the cavalry, and the soldiers were following the fugitives rapidly.

Dr. Seymour Rejected.
In the Episcopal Convention, at 4 o'clock p. m., the vote on the confirmation of Dr. Seymour, the bishop elect to the diocese of Illinois, was taken, the doors leading to the house being locked and guarded by the police. The result was as follows: Ayes, 10; noes, 10. The vote resulted in a tie, and the candidate for a bishopric received a majority vote of the diocese represented in convention. It was named from a delegation that Dr. Seymour's defeat was due, principally, to a letter written by Bishop Cox, and secondly to papers written by Professor Russell of the N. Y. theological seminary, in which Dr. Seymour is charged with allowing Father Grafton, an extremist of Boston, to have access to the students in the seminary of N. Y.

More Failures—Suit against General Butler—The Vote in the Seymour Case.
The Evening News says that Mackin & Co., bankers of Newark, N. J., have failed; liabilities, several hundred thousand dollars. Howell & Co., clothiers, of Bond and Market streets, Newark, are the principal losers being two-thirds of the failure is real estate speculation. The Commercial says that the respectable house of the Produce Exchange, and pretty extensively engaged in grain operations, have suspended, their debt to the heavy losses during the past year, but say that with forbearance of the creditors they will be able to resume business shortly.

Joseph E. Roberth has commenced a suit in the supreme court of King's County to recover from General Butler, the balance of the legal fees in the cotton case, gained by the late Gassaway B. Lamar, from the U. S. government.

Banks to be Closed.
MADRID, 22.—The government has issued an order directing the winding up of the provincial banks within a month.

Resumed Command.
SANTANDER, 22.—General Elia has resumed command of the Carlist forces, and General Mendiz has taken a subordinate position, both are with Don Carlos at Estella.

Carlist Chief Arrested—Free From Carlist.
The Carlist Chief, Lozano and Foster have been arrested, while passing through Cordova, in disguise. It is reported that Lozano will be summarily tried and executed at the depot where he recently ordered the shooting of several railway officials of Murcia and Alicante are now free of Carlists.

Councils General.
PARIS, 22.—Thus far 81 Councils General have chosen their presidents; of this number 52 are conservatives and 29 republicans, being a conservative gain of six.
