It is admitted there will be great difficulty in preparing a bill which will be just, alike to the railroads and the shippers. It is proposed to require common carriers to have shipping fa-cilities at designated points within a reasonable time after notification of the requirement of the shipper, and failure to have the necessary cars after such notification shall subject the railroad to certain penalities pre-scribed either by the act itself or by the interstate commerce commission. The interstate commerce commission, The interpretation of the term "reason-uble time" and the question of the proper penalties will tax the commit-tees and provoke a great deal of dis-cussion in both senate and house,

RECIPROCAL DEMURRAGE.

RECIPROCAL DEMURRAGE. The legislature of the state of Wash-ington has adopted and sent to Con-gress a memorial asking that "recipro-cal demurrage" be incorporated info-the federal commerce law. The plan has worked well in Washington state, and it is believed that it would be equally effective as a national policy. As matters stand today a railroad cor-poration is in no way required to ac-celetate the movement of freight over its lines. A carload of grain has been known to be weeks on the road be-tween Chicago and Washington. The consignee lost heavily because of the delay yet he could obtain no redrass. The particular car referred to hap-pened to reach Washington one Thurs-day afternoon and was not unloaded until the following Monday. The con-atignee paid demurrage charges for two until the following Monday. The con-signec paid demutrage charges for two days-he couldn't get his grain until he did no. Under the Washington law he would have been entitled to dam-arcs and it is proposed to apply the old adage about the "goose" and the "gander sauce" to such cases. Every shipper will endorse the proposition, TO REPLACE SEED.

On the morning of Nov. 6 fire de-stroyed practically all the seed stored in the warehouse of the agricultural department, these seeds being intend-of for the annual spring distribution by senators and members of the bouse among their constituents. At the time stories were written that this loss of seeds would entail considerable incon-venience to the farmers and truck gardener who yearly has depended on the government for his annual supply of seeds. However, the loss will be replaced immediately and the seeds go out ar usual, or rather almost as, promptly as though the fire had not accutred. Necretary of agriculture has officially bhormed Congress of the loss and requests an emergency appropria-tiou of \$50,000. This request to re-pair damage by fire will undoubtedly be one of the first bills to go through Congress after the holiday recess and as stated there will be scarcely a per-centible delay in the singula distribu-tion of seeds by the government. the morning of Nov. 6 fire do-
