ation Authorized. The stockholders of the Honerine Mining company held a special meeting last night at which an amendment to the articles of incorporation was auth-orized. The change will vest the corpor-ation with power to acquire stocks, bonds, etc., in other companies, and to give it the right to sell any part of its real or personal property and recover in payment cash, stocks, bonds or any other obligation of the purchaser, at other obligation its discretion.
