meeting here next Tuesday. The trustees of the New York Life Incompany held an adjourned meeting today and accepted the resignation of Oscar S. Strauss from the board. James T. Eckels of Chicago was elected a trustee, as was ex-Mayor Fielschmann of Cincinnati. Seth M. Milliken was nominated for trustee to succeed James A. Blair, and John Reid was nominated to succeed Mr. Strauss. The New York Life will continue to do business in France. The trustees passed a resolution directing the offi-cers of the company to apply to the French government for registration under the new French law. This law re-quires that all foreign life insurance companies shall maintain in France arge reserves against the French business, not only that which is to be writ-ien in France, but that which has been written in the past.

THE SALTON SEA.

### Southern Pacific Will Make Final Effort to Control the Colorado.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 25 .- Officials of the Southern Pacific railway, who have just arrived in Los Angeles from the vicinity of Salton sea, bring word that the railroad company is about to make a final effort to shut off the torrent of waters that is rushing from the Colorado river into the Salton sea

and menacing the tracks and right of way of the company. The river is failing now, and the engineers are only swaiting a sufficiently low level to comthe final stages of the work which they hope will be successful in turning the river back into its old channel and permanently checking its ravages. About \$2,000 feet of water er second is now pouring down the colorado river, the greater portion of which is flowing through the old Cali-fornia Development company's canal intake into the Salton sea bed. But tiny stream makes its way on to the fulf of California, while Salton sea dally widens and deepens. The flow into the sink at the mouth is at this time more than 2,000 feet wide. The South-ern Pacific has 1,000 men camped along the bed of the river below Yuma, They have completed the preliminary work, looking to the closing of the flow into Salton sea, and are only waiting the expected fall of the river, which it is thought will occur within the next six weeks. The engineers expect to close the gap and throw the river back into its old channel and on its way to the sulf by a series of flood gates and dams which have already been constructed, and are ready to be placed.

#### TORPEDO SINKS BOAT.

Newport, R. I., July 25.-A White-bead torpedo fired from the dock at the torpedo station during practise today struck and sank a boat in which four seamen gunners were seated. A life-beat rescued the seamen. The torpedo was not charged, but it was driven with sufficient force by compressed air to break a hole in the boat at a dis-tance of 300 yards. The men in the were stationed on the range line to pick up the spent torpedo, and by muschance they got in the way of it.

#### ORDERED TO DISARM.

#### TO DEAL WITH CANNED GOODS.

London, July 25 .- The health officers of the metropolis have formulated pro-posals dealing with canned goods for the consideration of the various bor-ough authorities. The most important clauses provide that the name and adress of the manufacturer and the date canning be impressed on all tins; that one per cent of each consignment shall be opened on importation and examined before the goods are marketed and that food intended for canning shall be inspected by an independent official prior to being canned. The use of preservatives is strictly prohibited.

# HORACE G. MCKINLEY. Alleged Land Fraud Conspirator on

# His Way From China.

Portland, Or., July 25 .- Horace G. McKinley, one of the arch conspirators in the land frauds in this state, ac-cording to the Oregonian, is now on his way to San Francisco from China, and will arrive at the Bay City within two weeks. Since his conviction last year in the United States district court of Oregon, along with S. D. Puter, D. W. Tarpley, Frank H. Walgamett and Mrs. Emma L. Watson, McKinley has traveled over a considerable por-tion of the United States and China. Detectives were on his trail during a large part of his wanderings, but he finally escaped them and went to the

crient. His bondsmen have never surrendered him, and he is free to come and go almost as he pleases. Four indictments are pending against McKinley in this state, and it was to await his trial on these in-doctments that Asst. United States Atty-Gen. Heney consented to his re-lease on bonds before presenting him in court for sentence under the for-mer conviction. It is expected that he will come north and submit to a content of the sentence sentence at once on his arrival at San Francisco.

San Francisco. S. A. D. Puter, who was convicted with McKinley, was sentenced to two years in the Multhomah county jall and a fine of \$7,000. Emma L. ## TEXAS WAREHOUSE BURNED.

Beaumont, Texas, July 25.—The large brick warehouse of the McFad-din-Weise-Kyle Rice Milling company, containing 50,000 sacks of rice, was destroyed by fire of unknown origin early today. The rice was valued at \$200,000, and the building and con-tents at about \$115,000. #### S, P. STRIKE SETTLED.

Oakland, Cal., July 25.—The strik-ing freight handlers of the Southern Pacific company resumed work this afternoon, the strike having been set-tled. The company agrees to grant the men the increase in wages demanded, which is from 224 cents to 25 cents an hour, effective Aug. 1. It is further agreed in reference to overtime pay that if the men work 16 minutes or more they shall be paid for half an hour and that if they work 30 minutes or more they shall be paid for
