ILLINOIS.

CHICAGO -Oue of the mo ful elucidations of a mysterious murder and the detection of the supposed perpetrator, in the history of crime, was made public this morning. On January 2nd, 1871, the body of a man, accertained to be that of M. W. Gumbleton, a stranger in the city, was found floating in the lake, near the month of Chicago river, the body exhibiting mark of violence. The Coroner's inquest de veloped the fact that Gumbleton was recently from Baltimore and had a considerable amount of money, Including one draft on that city for 37,800, and came to the conclusion that he was a conclusion tha murdered. The case was put into the hands of Detective Joseph Dixon, of this young German named Zeitenmeger, who had been the companion of Gumbleton in Baltimore and who came to the Queen. They were received with this city with him, was the murderer, He finally succeeded in tracing him to his native place near Bremen, Germany. A description of the man was sent to the U. S. Consul at Bromen. Yesterday a cable dispatch was received from him by the Superintendent of Police here, saying the man was arrested and swaited extradition. He will be sent for at once. After the murder was com-

mitted Zeizenmeger successfully repre-tented his victim, both here and in New York, until he had converted all Gumbiston's assets into money.


