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

#### STRANGE EXPERIENCE.

A TOLEDO MAN LIVES THROUGH AN AGE IN THIRTY SECONDS.

A Toledo Eye man was sitting in an office on Adams Street recently, chatting with the occupant, a well known young lawyer, when the conversation turned to dreams and the rapidity with which the human world—during sleep.
