ELECTION OFFICER TAKEN TO TASK BY A CONTEMPORARY.

For some time past the Terri our Provo exchange, has been tention to alleged high-handceedings on the part of a Depu-istrar named Thomas Beesley who presides, by the grace of the Utah Commission, over the destinies of voters in that vicinity Mr. Beesley has been charged with striking from the registry lists names of certain citizens possessing every qualification to deposit their ballots at the polls, and when up-braided for his illegal and unwarranted act, claimed to be carrying out the instructions of the Commission that officially created him. Enquirer, which exposed his autocratic operations, through the lumns of the daily Standerer of this city, with epithets which, while very familiar to readers of that sheet, we do sponsibility. We give below, the Enquirer's retort, which pretty well explains the situation, and sets forth the evil complained of:
