The Italian admiral and the port officers visited the Connecticul to pay their respects to Rear Admiral Sperry and express appreciation for American sympathy and aid. Admiral Sperry

ATTEMPT TO CROSS CONTINENT IN BALLOON

Los Angelos, Cal., Jan. II.—Charles A. Coey, president of the Aeronsulique elub of Chicago, states that he will make an attempt to cross the continent in his balloon the Chicago. It has been carefully studying the local situation from the standpoint of a balloonist, and is flemily convinced that the project is feasible. He will be accompanied by Mrs Coey. The balloon is being shipped to this city. Capt. L. Bumbaugh, who will go with Mt. and Mrs. Coey, will come to Los Angeles about Jan. 25, and final arrangements for the trip will be considered following his arrival. "There are three ways in which the trip may be made," sald coey. "One is under conditions which will permit a shoot over the mountains, and a straightaway journey without a stop. A second is by coming down at night and anchoring until the next morning, when the warm sun will bring an expansion of gas with a much greater lift than the night before. As a bird expedient it maybe possible to go as far
