More often, however, the gold in the deposits is associated with basic rocks like diabase or diorite instead of with silica, and reasons are found for concluding that, in general, heavy eruptive rocks have brought up some of the metallic gold from the earth's interior, and after exidation and crossion the lighter materials of these rocks have been washed away, leaving the heavier portions, including the gold. On taking from the mold, the cup is given an external wrapper of paraffined paper for protec-tion in handling, and is then placed in cold storage until wanted for use.

Anthropologists are finding that there Anthropologists are finding that facts are odors peculiar to races as well as individuals. Dogs quickly recognize the individual odor, but our dull sense of smell seldom perceives it. Negroes and Chinese notice in the white men the odor of death. Herve records that ne-proces have a marked odor of goats; and Japanese and Chinese are said to have odors so distinct that it has been posd-ble to tell by the smell whether a dis-patchbox came from Pekin or Tokio.

The automatic gas lookout of Arnold Philip and Louis J. Steele, two Brit-ish marine engineers, is designed to detect leakages of combustible spaces of larger vessels. The presence of gas-oline vapor or dangerous gas is shown when the proportion is only a third of that required to form an explosive mixture with air, and warning is thus given in time to prevent accident. The apparatus includes an electric motor air pump, with small pipes through which alt is drawn from all parts of the vessels where old or gas loaks are likely to occur. When the air sucked in contans any considerable amount of hammable vapor or gas, a white light goes out and a red light is light goes out and a red light is lighted, and at the same time an elec-tric bell is sounded. An indicator also shows the pipe through which the con taminated air has been drawn.

The necessity of the rotation of cropis well recognized among modern farm-ers, and now it appers that in India nature is seen practising the same thing in the forests. The number of beats per minute is then indicated on the dual. Again pressing the button sets the hand at starting point, and the watch is ready for another determination. Besides this use, the apparatus is also adapted this use, the apparatus is also adapted for automatically recording any observations in minutes, seconds, and fifths of a second.
