

NEGRO CONFESSED CRIMINAL ASSAULT

When Confronted With His Victim, Said: "Yes, Lady, I'm the One."

HANGED AND THEN BURNED.

Body Whirled, a Few Groans Heard, Then Flames Obliterated All.

Chickasha, I. T., July 1.—A negro who committed a criminal assault upon the 16-year-old daughter of Mr. Robertson, near Womack, was captured last night and after being taken back to the scene of his crime was hanged and burned near the spot where he committed the crime. He confessed his crime and offered no resistance to the mob. To one person the negro gave his name as Cliff Mays of Marshall, Tex., and he told another that it was Will Robertson of San Antonio.

By the time the negro was overtaken near Bradley last night fully 400 men had joined in the chase, and soon after the capture the march to Womack began. It was nearly 2 o'clock this morning when the Robertson home was reached and the negro was brought before the assaulted girl.

"That's the one," said she at once, and the negro replied:

"Yes lady, I'm the one, Gentlemen I admit the crime."

The mob then proceeded with their victim past the spot where he had committed his crime and to a tree in the road on the bank of Walnut creek, where a rope was thrown over a limb about 15 feet high and the other end knotted about the man's neck.

He was given an opportunity to speak, and again he confessed his guilt, and after a fervent prayer to God for forgiveness he was drawn into the air to die by strangulation. Before life was extinct the body was lowered to the ground, logs and brush were heaped upon it and the mass ignited. For a moment the body whirled, a few groans were heard and the flames consumed their work. Two hours later the charred body was buried under the same tree, under the direction of a deputy marshal from Purcell, who had been thwarted in his efforts to take the negro from the mob.

Miss Robertson's condition is not serious.

COAL MINERS AND GUARDS IN FATAL CONFLICT.

Wheeling, W. Va., July 1.—The Bradley mine of the United States Coal company was the scene this afternoon of a quarrel, in which one miner was killed and a number wounded, as well as several guards.

Sheriff Voorhees of Jefferson county, Ohio, was on the scene tonight investigating the trouble. The women of the town fled to Smithfield, where they were given shelter in the town hall, as more trouble was expected.

Frank Hicks, an English miner, who lives in Smithfield, stated this evening that one mine owner, a foreigner, was instantly killed from a shot by a guard, and that five miners were badly wounded, and that there were probably more wounded but they could not be found. He said that he was reliably informed that eight guards were wounded, but how seriously he could not tell.

The trouble, Hicks said, was started by the guards, who, he claimed, were drinking. Hicks said the guards shot into the houses, and the women secured their children and fled to Smithfield. Hundreds of shots were fired. Mine officials were away spending Sunday at their homes, but they will be on the scene tomorrow.

LIQUOR IN GUTTER.

Crowd Sang, "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow."

Canon City, Colo., July 1.—City officials, assisted by a number of church people, made a raid today on the Canon City Tavern, club, where liquor-selling is said to have been going on, arrested the proprietor after a hard fight, and spilled the stock of liquor into the gutter of the street.

Through on their way to church witnessed the raid, and as the whiskey, beer and wine filled the gutters, sang "Praise God, from Whom all blessings flow." Today's raid, said the climax of the anti-liquor fight began over a year ago when the temperance element got control of the council. The saloons shut business, but many alleged "clubs" started up, which have made stubborn fights against the efforts to close them up.

ANXIETY FOR STEAMER AMERICA.

Rome, July 1.—All inquiries by government officials and officers of the Fabre Steamship company relative to the steamer America of the Fabre line, now more than one week overdue at New York, have been fruitless. It has been ascertained that the America had 50 Italians on board.

The America left Marseilles June 2 and St. Michaels June 10 and should have arrived at New York about June 27. The agents of the Fabre line say the steamer may have been delayed by damage to her machinery, compelling her to go at reduced speed, or that she may have taken a disabled vessel in tow.

MAY CALL OUT GUARDS.

El Paso, Tex., July 1.—Orders have been issued at Phoenix, Ariz., to hold three companies of the Arizona national guard in readiness to proceed to Morenci and Clifton, Ariz., where a strike is threatened in the mines.

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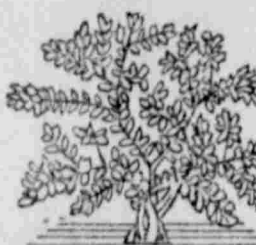

PRESIDENT WILL SPEND SUMMER AT OYSTER BAY.

When the president stepped from the train Kermit greeted him, Mrs. Roosevelt waiting in the wagonette. Former Sheriff Jerome Johnson cut one more notch in his record of being the first of the townspeople to shake the hand of the president. Many others in the little Sunday morning gathering at the station uttered words of greeting and felicitations. The attempt of a man with a camera to snap the president as he took his seat by Mrs. Roosevelt was interfered with by the secret service men.

ASCENDED VESUVIUS.

Duke of Aosta Lays Cornerstone of New Village of Ottajano.

Naples, July 1.—The Duke and Duchess of Aosta and the Duke and Duchess of Salaparuta today laid the cornerstone of the new village of Ottajano. The affair was marked by great enthusiasm. It is a large number of people from San Giuseppe Vesuviano, Santa Anna and other villages injured by the eruption of the volcano last April witnessed the ceremony. The weather, however, was unfavorable, there being a heavy rainstorm, with lightning and thunder, and the heat being oppressive. The cornerstone is composed of cement and clinders.

GREAT LACK OF SAILORS.

San Francisco, July 1.—According to the information received from the headquarters of the sailors' union, 25 steam schooners belonging to the members of the United Shipping & Transportation are now laid up for want of men to sail them. These boats are all reported to have done a rushing business in the lumber trade before the strike, but now, it is said, they will lie idle for an indefinite period.

MANUEL GARCIA DEAD.

London, July 1.—Manuel Garcia, the famous professor of singing and inventor of the laryngoscope, died today. He was born March 17, 1860.

SIR WILFRED LAWSON DEAD.

London, July 1.—Sir Wilfred Lawson, Liberal member of parliament for the Camborne division of Cornwall, died in London today, aged 77 years. He had been ill for some time.

SHOT BY INSANE MAN.

Los Angeles, July 1.—An Italian supposed to be insane shot and probably fatally wounded Emil Martinez, another Italian, this evening, at Center and Commercial streets here, and upon being pursued by a crowd emptied his revolver as he fled, firing three shots at his pursuers, wounding Guadalupe Bernal in the left leg. He managed to elude the crowd and the police. Martinez was shot through the stomach and will probably die.

TWO BULLETS IN HIS BRAIN.

Pittsburg, July 1.—With two bullet wounds in his head, Robert McKnight, 21 years old, a son of Harry C. McKnight of the east end, lies in the Pittsburg hospital in a critical condition. The physicians express little hope for his recovery. Statements differ as to how young McKnight received the wounds. His father declared the affair to be an accident, but refused to divulge any details. Young McKnight was a member of a prominent Pittsburg family and was well known in New York, where he visited often and was associated with prominent families.

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OIL TANKS EXPLODE.

Concussion so Great People of Portland Thought It Was an Earthquake.

Portland, Or., July 1.—With a force so great that every window within three-quarters of a mile radius was shattered and the earth shaken in Portland three miles away so that the people believed an earthquake had occurred, two of the tanks of the Union Oil company of California exploded at midnight at University Park, a suburb lying a few miles north of the city on the Willamette river. One man, Leonard Joqui, the night watchman, is missing and it is feared that he is dead. Both of the tanks were nearly empty, it being estimated that only 6,000 barrels of oil were lost. This, with the damage to the tanks, will amount to about \$15,000.

The cause of the explosion is not certainly known. It is stated that Joqui was seen near one of them immediately before the explosion occurred, and it is believed that in some manner ignition was communicated from the lantern to the oil. Nothing was seen of Joqui after the explosion and search for him resulted in the finding of part of his lunch basket.

The tanks are located almost on the bank of the Willamette and for some time several sawmills and drydocks which are situated a short distance down stream were in serious danger, as well as the big tanks of the Standard Oil company, which are but a few hundred feet away. The fire was confined to the vicinity of the two tanks through the efforts of hundreds of residents of the surrounding country and the fireboats which were sent to the fire from this city.

PRESIDENT SENDS LETTER TO SENATOR BEVERIDGE.

Washington, July 1.—President Roosevelt has sent the following letter to Senator Beveridge of Indiana, dated yesterday:

"My Dear Senator Beveridge:—I send you herewith the pen with which I signed the agricultural bill, containing the most important clauses. You were the man who first called my attention to the abuses in the packing houses. You were the legislator who drafted the bill which in its substance now appears in the amendment to the cultural bill and which will enable us to put a complete stop to the wrongdoings complained of. The pen is worth nothing to me, but I am glad to send it to you as the expression of my acknowledgment of your services. With all good wishes, believe me, faithfully yours,

ALL QUIET AT CANANEA.

Los Angeles, July 1.—A special to the Times from Bisbee, Ariz., says:

Matters are quiet at Cananea, the only disorder reported for the past week being an attempt upon the life of Ben Bond, an American ore contractor, who was shot at from ambush, though not hit. Bond had been active in quelling the disturbances last month, and threats have been made by the striking Mexicans against his life. A garrison of Mexican infantry is retained around the mine.

TO INVESTIGATE ICE TRUST.

Indianapolis, July 1.—A grand jury investigation into the workings of an alleged ice trust in this city will begin July 2. Fifty or more persons having knowledge of the ice situation will be called as witnesses. Prosecutor C. P. Benedict will have charge of the case, which he will conduct along the same lines as the Toledo, Ohio, proceedings, which resulted in the prison sentences for a number of ice dealers.

INTERNATIONAL PENNY POSTAGE.

London, July 1.—A deputation of both houses of parliament will wait on the chancellor of the exchequer and the postmaster general on Tuesday to urge the government to open negotiations for penny postage with the United States.
