DEATH OF A PIONEER.

Thomas S. Woodland, a Veteran of Early Days, Goes to Rest. Special Correspondence.

On the 14th of December, 1904, Thomas Steepleford Woodland died of pneu-monia at his residence at Willard. He was born in Edward county, Ill., Oct. 23, 1825, and was in his 80th year. He joined the Church at an early age

and shared the trials and hardships incident to the Missouri persecutions, and the final expulsion from that state. At Nauvoo he was intimately asso-ciated with the Prophet Joseph Smith and heard the fatal guns fired at Car-

thage jail on June 27, 1844. In 1846 he moved with his father to Potawatamie county, Iowa. In 1850 he emigrated to Utah and settled in the Fourth ward, Salt Lake City, where he remained for two years. In 1852 he moved to Willard, where he resided until his death. He took an active part in the Echo

canyon campaign and was familiar with the poverty and hardships incident to the early settlement of Utah.

Deceased was the husband of two
wives, was the father of 15 children; 87 grandchildren and 13 great-grand-children also cherish his memory.

He was a man of rugged, hardy and stalwart frame, and possessed great powers of endurance. He was a kind father, a genial neighbor, and a true and tried Latter-day Saint.
