RELIGIOUS SLAUGHTERS.

An ARTICLE in reference to a religious publication called Church of Home and Abroad, has been copied into several news-bulletin papers. We quote some space in a notice of The Church, as copied, in it is that missionary efforts by the various "Christian" sects may now be entered upon with a brighter prospect of success than in the past, and without those dangers which formerly beset them. The former condition is thus described:

"The time is not long ago when a missionary who desired to carry the word of salvation to the darker corners of the Terrene took his life in his hand and risked his all in the cause of God, with no action which confronted the most Christian adversaries him. Africa, for instance. There was a great measure of the forces of every will, with the author's energies could not fail to meet, even if he was present or not, the resistance of the people. Then in the last century and other places, among savages and semi-savages, and most of all among the Moors, those who were marked as enemies of the Church fell upon and slew by secret means, and aggressive Christians, names, and women were every where safe."

All this nonsense is the result of falsehood, left unblushingly by the "Christian" ministers, who have spent a short time in Utah, receiving the kindest of treatment from the "Mormon" people but making no converts from their ranks. We challenge the writer of the article from which we have made the above clipping to name an authentic case of either "secret" or open "murder," or of any danger from which, up to the "Moormen" upon a so-called "Christian" minister in any part of this territory.

This never has been such a case. Any statement or intimation that there has been nothing but sheer slander. Utah has been visited with the agents of the poorest specimens of human excrement that ever crawled upon this earth, through their nose for profit. They have gone back to the East and told the most abominable falsehoods and sensational romances, to draw money from the gullible and pious, and returning here have never been molested, although in some instances their wickedness and great have been exposed in print. But no preacher, missionary, or teacher of religion, however false, foolish or ignorant, has ever been molested by the "Moormen."

RINKEBY'S CASE.

We should require a great many thousand dollars to pay the expenses to visit this newspaper that has been devoted to the personal character of Patrik Rinkeby, within the past week. We do not believe the man is worth the money either in the good or in the evil he could or would be likely to do. The cause of all is, that he has been minister of the United States in Chile during a more or less critical time, and has not, according to the evidence thus far, persecuted the dullest of his calling in the heat of style.

The main facts of the controversy are these. The people of the United States have been intensely interested in the civil war that has been going on in the Republic of Chile. The reports from there were conflicting, but to obtain any accurate knowledge of the merits of the two causes, in the strife impossible, yet Mr. Patrik Rinkeby, who was on the ground all the time, whether he reported in the press or not, was compelled to say, but did not say, plain since the close of the conflict stage that he failed completely in harboring his country with correct knowledge of the situation.

It is charged that he apparently joined the cause of the rebels, was the result of a money or other valuable consideration from Balme. But let that go. There are other sufficient reasons why he should not have been chosen as United States representative to Chile to any other country.
