LOCAL BRIEFS.

George A. Cole and Ernest S. Holmes of Salt Lake have been appointed clerks in the postoffice, and Theodore A. Curry, nightwatchman. The appointments will take effect July 1st.

The many friends of Miss Carrie J. Stewart, the young lady who was operated on for appendicitis at the Holy Cross hospital last week will be pleased to learn that she is on the rapid road to recovery.

Mr. and Mrs. Selden I. Clawson left for Wasatch this morning, where they go to take charge of that resort for the summer season. They were accompanied by Miss Rebecca Morris. The resort opens tomorrow.

City Auditor Belser today issued warrants in payment of the monthly salaries of the elective officers and heads of departments, and the police department amounting in all to \$5,753.33, the fire department will be paid Monday.

At a special meeting of the board of public works this morning the form of contract and specifications for the laying of the 34-inch main in the City Creek canyon was adopted and the clerk was instructed to obtain bids for printing the same. The June payroll was approved.

A wagon belonging to the Standard Steam laundry company, driven by J. L. Johnson, collided with a street car on East Temple and Second South streets last evening. The driver of the vehicle was injured and Johnson's knees were skinned in jumping from the wagon.

L. M. Kanters, a Salt Lake youth, who has served in the Philippines for seventeen months in the Fourth infantry, has returned home. His regiment having been mustered out at San Francisco. He has entirely recovered from the wounds received at Carayan, Mindanao island.

Judge Stewart opened court today after being absent since Monday on account of illness. There were no cases on the calendar. So after the reading of the minutes court was adjourned till next Friday morning. In the meantime Judge Stewart will be in court hearing and setting small claims cases.

The regular quarterly examination of medicine, surgery and obstetrics will take place before the state board of medical examiners on Monday morning at 10 o'clock in the City and County building. It is stated that there is an unusually large number of applicants for certificates to practice in the professions named.

The "News" has received from the Johnson company a set of very fine stereoscopic views illustrating the funeral services of the late President Q. Cannon. The ones showing the immense congregation in the Tabernacle is very interesting. The appointment is made in the advertising columns of the "News" that these photos are now on sale.

A Rapid Transit car ran into a wagon of the Model steam bakery between F and G streets yesterday. The contents of the wagon were strewn along the road, but no other property was damaged. An anti-Rapid Transit car ran into a vehicle containing two men on State and Fifth South last evening. They drove right in front of the car and the result was a collision. Both of the men aboard the motorcar of all blame.

After living for two years in the safe in the city treasurer's office the \$5,610 shares of Dalton & Lark mining stock, which were turned over to the city when Bacon's bank failed six years ago, have at last assumed a value. It was decided that J. E. Dooley and W. S.

McComick, who were sureties on former City Treasurer May's bond, were not liable for \$15,000 of city funds which were on deposit when the bank assigned. Yesterday the announcement was made that each share of the Dalton & Lark stock was entitled to a dividend of 100 cents on account of the sale of the mining property. This amounts to \$4,629.05.

State Engineer Doremus, City Engineer Kelsey, accompanied by Engineer A. P. Stover, of Payson and Engineer Taylor of Washington, who are in the Department service, went to Utah Lake this morning to make an investigation of the irrigation methods of the Utah Lake and Jordan river valleys, on the plan outlined by Prof. H. H. Henshaw.

From his observations Engineer Taylor will prepare a written report for the use of the government. Mr. Henshaw only returned from Cheyenne yesterday afternoon where he was attending the convention of irrigation engineers of the arid land states.

Belief That D. C. McLaughlin Assigned Valuable Stock to His Wife.

Mrs. D. C. McLaughlin is preparing to file a petition asking to be appointed administratrix of her deceased husband's estate.

In searching through Mr. McLaughlin's papers his brothers have been unable to find a will and their belief is that no will has been made.

It is thought that Mr. McLaughlin just before he was brought to the hospital assigned the bulk of his property to his wife. It is known that he did so with his \$200,000 shares of Quincy stock, valued at \$400,000. And it is believed that he also assigned to her 1,000 shares of Silver King through the instruments transferring the stock have not been found.

Mrs. McLaughlin and her daughter, of course, receive the entire estate in the absence of a will, but the assignment of the stock will simplify matters greatly.

TELEPHONE TO THE BIG HORN.

Rushing Work to Connect Mormon Colonies With Salt Lake.

FIVE HUNDRED MILE LINE.

Manager Murray Says It Will be One of the Most Important Undertakings in Intermountain Country.

The work of constructing the telephone line to connect the Big Horn country with Salt Lake via Rock Springs, Wyoming, is being pushed from the northern end. Manager Murray of the Bell company states that this line, which, when completed, will be about 500 miles in length, is one of the most important undertakings in which the Bell company has been engaged in the Intermountain country. The line will connect Billings, Bridge and Red Lodge, Montana, with Lander and Rock Springs, Wyoming, and thence with Salt Lake. It will connect the Big Horn country and particularly the large Mormon colony located there with Salt Lake. The line will also open up to communication by telephone from Salt Lake the shoshone Indian reservation and the miners' relief mining district. Manager Murray says that the line is of much importance to Salt Lake business men, some of whom annually make large shipments of merchandise to that country. When it is completed, Salt Lake will be connected directly with Billings, Montana, via Boise City and Butte, and via Rock Springs, thus affording Northern and Union Pacific railroads and the principal cities and country tributary to Salt Lake a commercial center.

Manager D. S. Murray of the Bell Telephone company stated today that the line between Park City and Brighton will be erected. He says that work will commence some time previous to July 10th, and that it will take about two weeks to construct the line.

WARRANT FOR ARREST.

Maggie Hoagland Yesterday Applied to County Attorney Christensen for a warrant for the arrest of Frank E. Hoagland on a charge of bigamy. The county attorney did not consider that public interests would in any way be subserved by the issuance of the warrant. He therefore refused, and received anything but a blessing from Mrs. H. Her fifth suit for divorce from Hoagland is now pending in the district court. Twelve years ago Hoagland secured a divorce in Colorado, and two years ago the suit was set aside because of an irregularity in serving the summons on Mrs. Hoagland. Hoagland married again in 1894 and now Mrs. Hoagland wants him prosecuted for bigamy.

Mrs. Artie A. Putnam has obtained a divorce from Fred R. Putnam for desertion. The marriage was in December, 1892, and according to the testimony of Mrs. Putnam and Olive E. Meyer, Putnam deserted his wife in 1894. She gets the custody of her 6-year-old child.

Judge Hall yesterday ordered that William H. Green pay one-half his monthly earnings to his wife, commencing July 1st, an temporary alimony for the support of Mrs. Emma J. Green, who recently obtained a divorce from him, and their children. Attorney Sonnedecker moved that that part of defendant's answer which states that the plaintiff is unfit to have the charge of the children be stricken out, but Attorney Leebourne objected and the motion was denied.

Judge Morse held a night session of the district court last night to hear the cases of Ivan Whitaker and Arthur Meyer, charged with incorrigibility. The boys are only 13 years old and had been sent up from Justice McMillan's court in Murray, charged with having stolen \$12 from Dr. Ferber's drug store. Attorney Walton, for the boys, showed that their parents had not been regularly served with summons and the case was continued for a week.
