Ogden Junction, Sept. 30—

Last night some evil disposed
person or persons tore apart the
hand-rail from the foot bridge over
the Ogden river, and placed several
boulders on the bridge in such
position that a person stepping upon
them would inevitably slip and
fall over into the water, which
at this point is seven or eight feet
deep. The devilish spirit which
prompted this act is without excuse,
and the perpetrator of this attempt
to do bodily injury, if detected,
ought to be punished to the utmost
extent of the law.

A fire occurred at Harrisville on
Thursday by which some straw and
hay stacks, some corn, some pig-
sties, and a barn, belonging to Mr. J.
Hutchings, of Harrisville, were con-
sumed. The loss will not fall short
of \$500. Mr. Hutchings extends
thanks to his neighbors and friends
for their efforts to save his property.

We took a walk this morning to
see for ourselves what was going on at
the Iron Works, having learned
that work had been resumed there
the present week. The result of
our observation was to satisfy us
that the company means business,
and from the work going forward
we believe the furnace will soon be

The mixed train from Salt Lake

COUNTY CONVENTIONS.

On the 20th of Sept., 1878, a Peo-
ple's County Convention for Juab
County was held in Nephi, for the
purpose of electing three delegates
and three alternates to represent
said county in the People's Terri-
torial Convention, to be held in
Salt Lake City, October 7th, 1878,
to nominate a candidate for dele-
gate to Congress.

On motion Wm. Knight was
elected temporary president, and
Mr. Thos. Ord temporary secre-
tary.

Messrs. Charles Sperry and
Charles Foot were appointed a com-
mittee on credentials, and reported
the following named gentlemen en-
titled to seats, to wit: From Nephi
Territory, J. H. Hawley, Avila-
ham Somerville, Levan precinct,
Seth Olmstead, C. F. B. Lybbert.

W. Knight was elected perma-
nent president and Thos. Ord
secretary.

On separate motions the follow-
ing named gentlemen were duly
elected delegates: Grover, J. A.
Hawes, C. Foot; Alternates, Elmer
Taylor, John Pyper, Thos. Midg-
ley.

The following were passed—
"Resolved, That the Hon. George
Q. Cannon, having proved himself
the true friend of the people of Utah
Territory, and the true friend of
the People's Party, be nominated
by this county vote for that gen-
tleman as a candidate for Delegate
to Congress, subject to the vote of the
Territorial Convention.

"Resolved, That Messrs. J. Gro-
ver, C. Foot, W. Knight, Thos. Ord
and Edwin Hawley be a central
committee on elections for this
county, for two years and until
they are superseded.

"Resolved, That a synopsis of
the proceedings of this Convention
be sent to the DESERET NEWS and
Salt Lake Herald offices for pub-
lication.
