MORAN'S BILLS IN LIMELIGHT

Council Tonight Will Be Asked to Approve Several Big Fat Items.

REPAIRS ON OUTLET SEWER.

This Alone Amounts to Over \$20,000 And Represents Mistakes Made By Engineer and Board.

When the council meets tonight, the approval of P. J. Moran's bill for repairing the outlet sewer pipe, which he is afraid to test, will come up for reconsideration on the motion of Councilman Murdoch. His bill amounts to \$20,458.67 while the original contract was for approximately \$16,000. This bill represents the mistakes made by the city engineer in his plans and the board of public works in its inspection of the work.

Moran has several other bills before the council and it is probable that some of his lieutenants in the council will attempt to rush them through. There is a bill for \$3,000 for assisting the water department control the flood water in city creek which Moran wants. This bill was incurred in one Sunday and Mayor Bransford thinks that it is too high.

In the pouch of the board of public works, Moran has two estimates on Main street which have been held on because Moran failed to carry out the orders of the board in making expansion joints in repairing the sidewalk on Main street. The attitude of the board in this matter will probably be criticised by members of the council, if Moran asks them to take the matter up and order the board to pass on them.

The letter of Heuser & Davis, contractors of the North Temple street aqueduct asking for an extension of time to complete it, will probably be considered tonight. The council will probably deny an extension of time and order them to go on with the work. The contracts awarded to James Kennedy and the city engineer will come before the council tonight for approval besides considerable routine matters.
