The general opinion is that the manifesto represents a victory for Minister Sviatopolk-Mirsky and the conservative liberals over M. Pobodienostseff, and practically places the strong combinaion of M. Witte and Sviatopolk-Mirsky behind the government's program. The vagueness in which the reforms are outlined gives possibilities of expansio or limitation, according to their ideas. With a man of M. Witte's domination and force at the head of the committee of ministers, the general belief is that he will control in the end. Those with the zemstvolsts express the intention of continuing them despite the gov-ernment's note of warning. They be-lieve that the dissimilarity of the two locuments will enable them to continue the fight on the ground that the maniesto is in a conciliatory spirit and represents the views of the emperor and that the government note is the work of the bueaucracy.
