over 41,000 are children not more  
than eight years old. They held

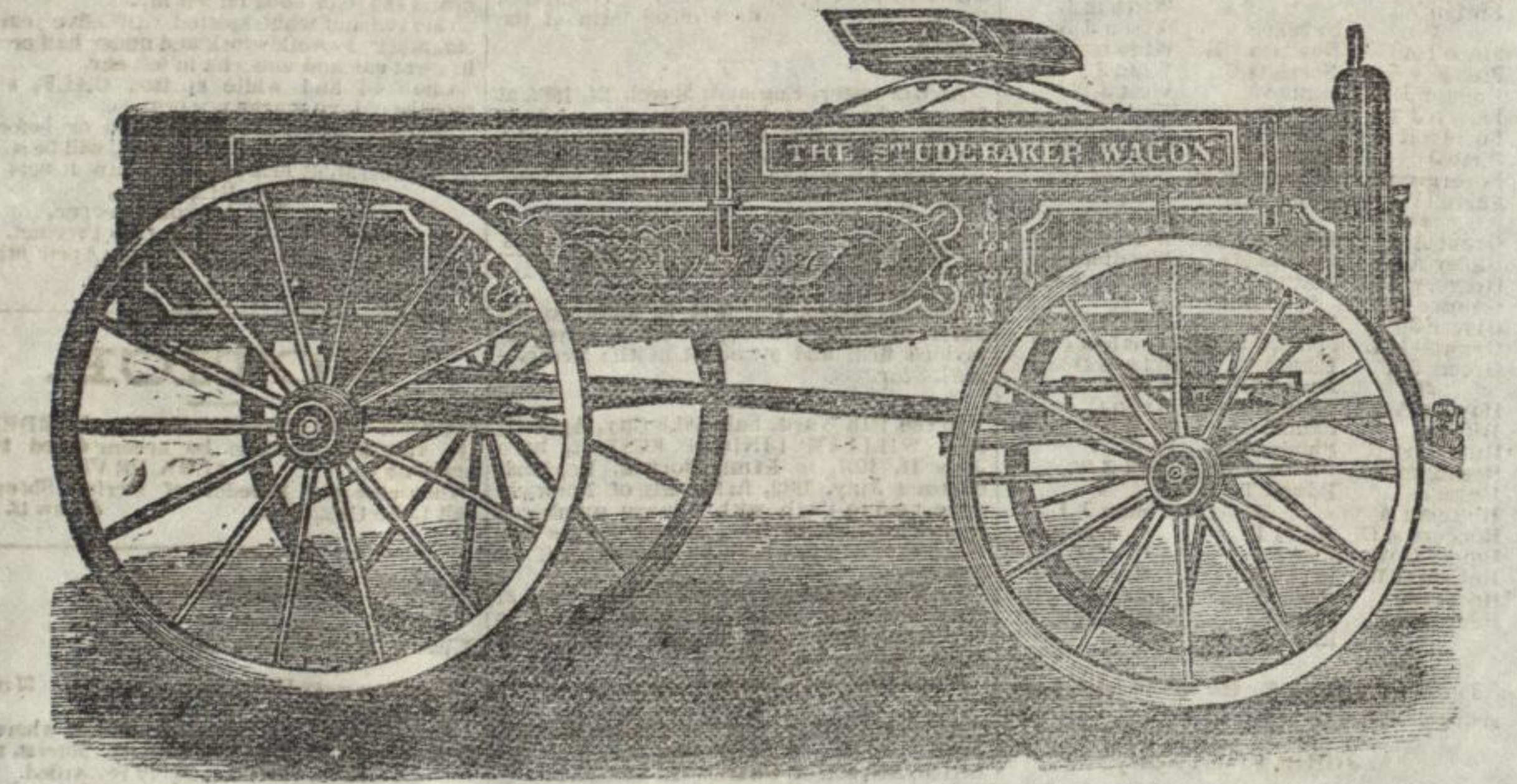
