GOOSE CREEK DISTRICT. A Utah Man Reports Very Rich

Copper Ore in Oregon.

Charles M. McEntire, a mining man of Mercur, Utah, who has just re-turned from a trin to Goose creek and the surrounding district, brought some

the surrounding district, brought some fine samples of copper ore obtained from the mines there. He visited the property of the North American Min-ing company and says that about thirty men are at the mine. The mine presents a busy appear-ance and new machinery is being put in, consisting of a hoist with an im-mense boller. Mr. McEntire said he did not know its capacity, but it must be very large, and he is of the opinion that the company intends to sink about 1,500 feet. There is a sawmill in op-peration, which is cutting between 3,000 and 4,000 feet of lumber a day. The lumber is used in erecting the bunk-houses and other buildings bunk-houses and other buildings around the mine. The mine is a very promising copper property and devel-opment work will be pushed this sum-

option work will be pushed this sum-mer. Mr. McEntire has some samples of copper ore which were taken from three different claims about two miles from Copper Buite. A sample from the latter property is sulphide ore and exceedingly rich. Some thirty years ago. Mr. McEntire says, a smelter was on the property and produced from four to five tons of copper builton. This was hauled to The Dalles, which wa, the nearest transportation point, and shipped to Swansea. Wales, for refine-ment.
