LOCAL BRIEFS.

Shipped to Wisconsin.—The remains of Dr. Clarence E. Barber were shipped today to Warren, Wis., for interment.

Only Hats and Suits.—The exhibit of the McCarty Hat company and the Parson Hat company at the fair includes only hats and suits—no shoes, as erroneously announced.

Leaves for New Orleans.—Walking Delegate A. H. Burt of the street car union has gone to New Orleans to attend the annual convention of the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Employees of America.

Accidentally Shot.—I. E. Wilkey was shot in the thigh Tuesday afternoon, by the premature discharge of a shotgun in the hands of a companion while duck hunting. The injury was not serious, but Mr. Wilkey is rather uncomfortable to carry around a charge of No. 5 shot.

Will Hold Reception.—The Badger club met last night, and decided to hold a reception and "get acquainted" social in the rooms of the Commercial club on the evening of the 15th inst. It was also decided to adopt a badge with a gold border and "B. C. of U." beneath. The club has 150 members.

MILK PRICE BOOSTED.

Manager Parker of Elgin Creamery Makes Good Promised Raise.

The raising of the price of a commodity, through an organization in restraint of trade, is always a third degree movement, the two previous degrees being the elimination of competition, and control of the entire output.

Milk has gone up in Salt Lake to 14 cents, or \$1 just as Manager Parker of the Elgin Dairy said it would some months ago. A concurring symptom is that there is only one exhibitor of cheese at the state fair this year—the Faust creamery, which divides the dairy product business in Utah with the Elgin people.

Before milk went up in Salt Lake, the symptom leading to it was the disappearance of the streets of Salt Lake of all independent peddlers. The milk peddlers who peddle in the city are now by the Elgin people, who would bid up the price till they got it, just as truck garden combine in San Francisco bid up the price of all garden products till they had completely cornered the market, when it proceeded to take it out on the public.

Milk peddlers were driven off the streets of Salt Lake by a high and almost prohibitive license. What influences worked to get this license fixed at an exorbitant and impossible figure is not clearly known, but both the Faust and the Elgin people are fighting it, and even if removed it would take some time to start the current of the old time peddlers back into the city, and thus reopen the closed channels of competition.

At present the only possible antidote for the raise in price, seems to be a public movement to discard milk from the bill of fare, and to be impracticable, leaves the situation without possible relief, except through releasing the high license, or city action limiting the price at which the trust may sell, and thus making it the case with hack drivers.
