MILK PRICE BOOSTED.

Manager Parker of Flgin Creamery Makes Good Promised Raise.

The raising of the price of a commodity, through an organization in restraint of trade, is always a third degree movement, the two previous degrees being the elimination of competition, and control of the entire output. Milk has gone up in Salt Lake to 14

quarts or \$1, just as Manager Parker of the Elgin Dairy said it would some bionths ago. A concurring symptom is that there is only one exhibitor of cheese at the state fair this year-the Faust creamery, which divides the dairy product business in Utah with the Elgin people. Before milk went up in Salt Lake, the symptom leading to it was the disan-

symptom leading to it was the disap-pearance off the streets of Sait Lake of all independent pedders. The milk of the farms was bought at the farms, of the farms, was cought at the farms, by the Elgin people, who would bid up the price till they got it, just as truck garden combine in San Francisco bid up the price of all garden products till it had completely cornered the mar-ket, when it proceeded to take it out on the public.
