More News-Selling Home-bred.

Spring City, March 3, 1874.

Editor Deseret News:

Last evening we had a fall of about four inches of snow and it probably fell about one foot in the mountains, so that our farmers are much encouraged about plenty of water for the coming season's irrigation—present prospects are very cheering.

Last week our county was visited by a U. S. Deputy Marshal, whose business seemed to be to look after any infractions of the revenue laws. He found some delinquents, among them were several old women, who had brewed beer without a brewing tub, about the size of an ordinary wash-tub, and probably may have sold a pint, a quart, or a gallon to some thirsty neighbor, and probably thereby violated the letter of the law, but I think, not very seriously the spirit of it. I am very glad, however, that the marshal to the county, for I have counseled the people long and loud to do no such thing, for two reasons—first, I wish to preserve the morals of the county, and second, to avoid any legal penalty.

The meanness of these informers appears the more conspicuous from the fact, that they never remonstrate with the offending party against their acts and delinquency to face, though some may be totally ignorant of existing laws with regard to brewed beer, which is undoubtedly the case.

The people now begin to think that my counsel to them was of some consequence, and I have no doubt that they will henceforth desist from these practices. It is the error that the marshal wish to correct, that correction is now effectually made.

I will venture to say that there is not such a thing in all Sanpete county as a brewery, nor ever has been. I have never known an apparatus in the county for the manufacture of beer above the capacity of a half dozen large sized wash-tubs. I have no plans to offer in behalf of those who sell whisky and other strong liquors without the proper license, but I have a plea in behalf of those who understand but indifferently the English language, and who perhaps make twenty gallons of beer from one isolated of malt—persons not quick to catch the meaning of my words, and who are consequently slow to understand the laws of the country, but they will all understand now everything pertaining to the disposal of home-brewed beer. But I do not think that the reformers. They care no more about the morals of the people nor about the infraction of the revenue laws than I care about the difference between the sound of a ram's horn and the taste of a persimmon.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO DOGS.

SEC. 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, that it shall not be lawful for any person to own or keep a dog within the limits of the City, without first applying to the City Recorder for that purpose, and shall pay to said Recorder, for the benefit of the City, an annual tax of one dollar. The Recorder shall register the applicant's name and a description of the dog and give to said applicant a certificate of registry. Any person found violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable to a fine in any sum not less than three nor more than ten dollars for each offense.

SEC. 2. All dogs so registered, shall wear a suitable collar with the owner's name or initials of the same inscribed thereon, together with the number corresponding with the certificate of registry, and all dogs found at large not so registered and collared as aforesaid shall be liable to be killed by any person.

SEC. 3. Any female dog found running at large while in heat, shall be liable to be killed, and the owner or possessor thereof, shall be liable to a fine in any sum not exceeding five dollars for each offense.

SEC. 4. Any owner or possessor of a dog permitting or suffering the same to enter or be in any place of worship during public service, shall be liable to a fine in any sum not exceeding five dollars for each offense.

SEC. 5. If any owner or possessor of a fierce, dangerous or mischievous dog, permit the same to go at large, he shall be liable to be fined for the first offense the sum of five dollars; for the second offense the sum of ten dollars; and upon the third conviction for the same offense, shall be liable to be killed. The said marshal is hereby authorized to catch and kill any of all dogs not so registered according to the provisions of this ordinance.

SEC. 6. Any person who shall kill, or cause to be killed, a dog registered as provided in this ordinance, without the consent of the owner or possessor thereof, or deprive a registered dog of its collar, or put a collar on any dog not registered, shall be liable to a fine in any sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

SEC. 7. This ordinance shall take effect from and after the first day of April next.

SEC. 8. An ordinance relating to dogs passed April 27th, 1869, be and the same is hereby repealed.
