LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Quick Work.—Those two plank crossings near the News office, upon which the Supervisor commenced work on Saturday, are already completed.

On the Rampage.—Stephen Henderson, a big miner, was on the rampage last night. Being full of bad liquor, he became exceedingly outrageous, flourishing his pistol in a threatening and dangerous manner. The police took him in tow, and this morning, he had to "pay the fiver," in the sum of \$10.

A Lamentable Case.—An aged female was let out of the City Jail, yesterday morning who was found in a terrible plight in the 3rd Ward, the previous evening. She was discovered lying upon the middle of the street, in a senseless state, not with a "cup of cold poison," but a canteen of whisky by her side. That aged person should mend her ways.

Peter Stock.—We understand that Peter Saxe & Son sold a couple of head of their fine stock, yesterday, to Mr. William Walker, of this city, the one animal being "Peerses Third" and the other "Baron of Goodness."

It is gratifying to notice that the interest manifested by a numerous class of our citizens in the matter of the raising of fine stock continues unabated.

Museum.—Professor Earfoot is constantly receiving additions to his fine collection of specimens and curiosities at the Museum. Not long since he obtained an acquisition also to the menagerie department, in the shape of a couple of grizzlies. The museum is a good place for the truth-seeker or scientifically inclined to spend a few hours in, and the gentlemanly manager is exceedingly attentive to the visitors. Children also take pleasure in examining the many curious relics of the collection.

City Council.—The regular meeting of the City Council was held last evening, Mayor Wells presiding, when the following, among other business, was disposed of:

Hewitt & Co. were granted an auctioneer's license for the term of one month.

Petition of E. B. Zabriskie and others, asking for the abatement of the lime kiln near the Theatre, on the ground of its being a nuisance, was referred to the committee on public grounds.

Petition of James Vincent and others, asking for the examination, by the supervisor, of the Second Ward street crossings, was referred to the committee on streets and alleys, as was also the petition of W. H. Hooper and others, asking that a plank crossing be laid across Second South Street, on the west side of West Temple Street.

The amount of the bill of the Superintendent of the Insane Asylum, \$555.23, was appropriated.

A committee report, recommending the granting of the petition of George E. Bourne and others, asking for the laying of a plank crossing, across First West Street, at the corner of that and Third South Street, was adopted.

Groesbeck and Crismon were granted the privilege of placing weighing scales in front of their stock yard, near the railroad depot.

The Marshall's bill of expenses for November, \$187.26, was reported correct and the amount was appropriated.

Bill of the city jailor for November, for boarding prisoners at fifteen cents a meal per head, amounting to \$294.75, was allowed.

Bill for improvements on bath house and insane asylum, \$269.88, was allowed.

Theatre.—By request of the management of the Theatre, the announcement was made in the News last evening that, owing to the failure of the Richards Combination troupe to make connection on the railroad, they would not reach this city in time for a performance this evening. POSTAL AFFAIRS.

Rates of Domestic Postage.

LETTERS—The standard single rate weight is 4 oz. avoirdupois. Single rate letter throughout the country, 3 cents. For each additional ounce, 3 cents. 100 lbs. 3 Drop letters, 1 cent.

NEWSPAPERS—The standard single rate is 4 oz. avoirdupois. Daily (seven times a week) 50c. per quarter. Semi-weekly, 15c. Tri-weekly, 15c. Weekly, 5c. Monthly, 5c.

The rate paid to be prepaid quarterly or yearly at the office where the newspapers is received.

Single newspapers, 1 cent. prepaid.

PERIODICALS—The standard single rate is 4 oz. avoirdupois. Semi-monthly, 60c. per quarter. Quarterly, 1c.

Examples of merchandise not over 13 oz. 3c. for each 2 oz. Miscellaneous printed matter, 3c. for each 4 oz. or fraction thereof.

The maximum weight of any package of printed or miscellaneous matter is 4 lbs. avoirdupois.

Registered Letters and Money Orders.

REGISTRATION—Letters may be registered on payment of a fee of eight cents, but the government takes no responsibility for safe carriage or compensation in case of loss.

MONEY ORDERS—All principal post offices are authorized to issue money orders and issue drafts for the same under other post-office regulations.

On orders not exceeding \$10, 5c. Over \$10 and not exceeding \$20, 15c. Over \$20 and not exceeding \$50, 25c. Over \$50 and not exceeding \$100, 35c. Over \$100 and not exceeding \$500, 45c.

INTERNATIONAL MONEY ORDERS on Great Britain, Germany and Switzerland, to the United States, France, Italy, Spain, and New York may be obtained upon the payment of 10c. per \$100.

ON GREAT BRITAIN.

On orders not exceeding \$10, 5c. Over \$10 and not exceeding \$20, 15c. Over \$20 and not exceeding \$50, 25c. Over \$50 and not exceeding \$100, 35c. Over \$100 and not exceeding \$500, 45c.

Rates of Foreign Postage.

The standard single rate to Great Britain, Germany, France, Italy, Spain, and the Continent (by French mails) is 15c. to the United States, 10c. to the Continent. The asterisk (*) indicates that prepayment is optional.
