PARIS STRUCTURES IN FRANCE.

NEW YORK.

Anniversary of Battle of New Orleans—Burglary—Free Library—Divorce Case—Deficiency in Bank Funds.

NEW YORK.—To-day being the anniversary of the battle of New Orleans, flags were displayed from the tops of many private and public houses, and from the masts of the shipping in harbor.

NEW YORK.—An announcement has been made that the Adams' Express office, at Washington, was robbed of \$29,500 in United States bonds, on New Year's day, the property of the Company.

The College of the City of New York throws open its library on and after Friday next.

The Daily News says that a divorce suit which promises rich developments, is reported, is about to commence in the courts of New Jersey. The parties are rather aged and well known, and are reported a director and officer of the Erie R. R. Co., reputed to be worth a million and a half, and his wife a young woman of twenty-two, a descendant of a wealthy Dutch family of Bergen.

An investigation of the affairs of the Families and Drivers' national bank, at Somers, by a government examiner, shows a deficiency of seventeen thousand, and traceable to the late cashier, Mr. Hill. The report that Oakley, cashier of the Merchants' Exchange bank, in this city, was concerned in this defalcation, is unfounded.

INDIANA.

Democratic State Convention.

INDIANAPOLIS.—The Democratic State Convention met to-day and organized by the election of Gen. James R. Slack for Chairman, R. J. Bright, of the Indianapolis Sentinel, and L. G. Matthews, of the New Albany Ledger, as Secretaries. Delegates from various districts were elected members of the Central Committee. A motion to allow the Central Committee to select its own Chairman was voted down by a large majority. A motion prevailed, to nominate State officers, beginning with the Judges of the Supreme Court.

MARYLAND.

Legal Opinion.

BALTIMORE.—Reverly Johnson has given an opinion that the various acts of the Maryland Legislature, imposing a tax upon the B. and O. Railroad for passengers over the Washington branch, are unconstitutional and void.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Governor's Message.

BOSTON.—The Governor's Message was sent to the Legislature to-day. The State debt is \$30,523,380, being an increase of over two million dollars during the year. The Governor doubts the expediency of lending State aid to the projects that are pressed on the Legislature. The expenses of the State for the year will be five and a half millions. In regard to the sale of liquor, the Governor says that the people of the State will not submit patiently to the restriction of the open bar.

CALIFORNIA.

Billiard Championship.

SAN FRANCISCO, 9th.—Deery retains the championship and diamond cue and wins \$1000. The game commenced at 8 20 P. M. and ended at 1.10 A. M., 99 innings. The highest runs were Deery 180, Dion 155. At the end of the 97th inning the game stood Dion 1486, when Deery made his great run and pocketed his balls. Dion missed and Deery ran the game out. The result was hailed with enthusiastic cheering by the thousands present.

FOREIGN NEWS.

WEST INDIES.

Cable Tariff Reduced—Plan to Squelch the Insurrection—Killing of Unarmed Men by Insurgents.

HAVANA.—The recent reduction of the Cuban cable tariff gives general satisfaction; a further reduction is contemplated when the West India cable is finished.

The Voce de Cuba, to-day, in an editorial, seriously advises the re-population of the Island of Cuba with Spaniards, and suggests that inducements be held out to forty thousand Spanish soldiers, who have arrived here, to settle permanently, and thus exterminate the enemies of Spain.

The Prensa announces the killing of unarmed men in the vicinity of Manacel, a few days since, by insurgents.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Saturday Review and the American Debt—Intended visit of President Grant to the Sovereigns of Europe—Challenge to the World from the Owner of the Yacht "Sappho."

LONDON.—The Saturday Review, to-day, in its main article, on American finances, thinks that the chances are decidedly against the repudiation of the national debt on the part of the United States, because its payment is easy and profitable. The story has lately been extensively published on the continent

that President Grant will soon visit the Sovereigns of Europe, and that he will make a trans-Atlantic voyage, accompanied by a fleet of iron-clads, and Mr. William Douglas has issued a challenge to the world to race his yacht Sappho to Sandy Hook, on the 4th of July next.

CANADA.

Proposed Railroad from Ottawa to Fort Garry.

OTTAWA.—Notice has been given, through the Official Gazette, that application will be made to Parliament next session for an act incorporating a company to build a railroad from Ottawa to Fort Garry, Red River, and thence to the confines of British Columbia; also for the construction of a branch thereof from Fort Garry to the most convenient point of the United States, with power also to build steamers and other vessels and navigate the river Saskatchewan and the branches, rivers and lakes traversed by the railroad; also that the credit of the Dominion be extended in aid of such company by granting mortgages on the wild Crown Lands along the route in proportion as the work proceeds. The name of the company will be the "Canadian and Pacific Railroad Navigation Company."

FRANCE.

Ambassadors Resigned—Committees for Violating the Press Law—Pardon of Prisoners by the Emperor—The Pope's Infirmary.

PARIS, 8.—It is announced to-day, on the best authority that the French Ambassadors in London and Berlin have resigned.

PARIS, 8.—The trial of Mons. Rappel for the violation of the press law has been concluded. Chas. Hugo and Felix Platt, the chief editors, were sentenced to four months imprisonment, and to pay a thousand francs each. The latter was also sentenced additionally to four months' imprisonment with a thousand francs as fine for having distributed among the soldiers in barracks, an article calculated to ferment an insurrection.

Prime Minister Olivier recently petitioned the Emperor for the pardon of the miners who have been sentenced to various terms of imprisonment for participation in the riots at Aubin, some time ago. The Emperor has complied to-day the prisoners were set at liberty.

The memorial diplomatic asserts that a compromise has been arranged on the question of the infallibility of the Pope. Infallibility will be affirmed, but dissent from the article will be allowed.

MEXICO.

Seward in Mexico—Death of an Editor—Destruction by Freshets—Revolutionists busy.

HAVANA.—Advices from the City of Mexico, to the 1st, says that Governor Seward was at the Capital, but was expected to leave.

Senor Seanco, editor of the Siglo, and a prominent politician, is dead; Congress has appropriated \$20,000 for the relief of his family.

Great freshets have occurred in the province of Chiapa; the water had completely washed away many farms lying along the borders of the rivers, and it was computed that no less than 200 lives had been lost. General Negretes' partisans had invaded and captured Losheries. The revolution in San Luis, Potosi, was increasing. In Puebla the insurgents had captured several towns and were defeating the government troops and were capturing and executing them. The revolution was daily increasing.

AMHERST, LOREAIN COUNTY, Dec. 29th, 1869.

Editor Deseret News.—Dear Sir.—As it is two months since I left our mountain home, I thought I would let you know how things have gone with me in this part of Northern Ohio. I came to my brothers, in Oberlin, on the 8th of November, and after a stay of two days I went north ten miles to see another brother and many relatives, and to see if I could not get a meeting. All seemed glad to see me, but had no interest in what I had to say about the gospel. I then concluded to go to a Methodist meeting, and then stayed to class meeting, and they had, according to their rules, to ask me to speak and I did so, and said a few words about the knowledge of the true God, and Jesus Christ whom He had sent, and it was quite a contrast to their groaning. I then went to a prayer meeting in the evening and I firmly believe that they all spent the most of their time looking at me to see where the horns came out. I spoke again on the principles of eternal lives, and made out from that to get inquiry enough to get a schoolhouse on the next Sabbath. I was joined then by my traveling companion, LeGrand Young, and since then we have had six school houses, one church and one town hall and have had full and attentive congregations and many conversations with doctors, lawyers, judges and influential citizens.

We placed our positions before them in its true light as far as we could, and out of the whole there is not much interest manifested. There will be two or three baptisms.

As far as we are concerned we do not think that we owe them anything, and when all of their Government bonds are consumed and the holders are put in prison for not taking us in and defraying our expenses, and look out through the gates to see if they cannot see some Elder of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to whom they can call for help, then perhaps, we will wait on them; until then we feel that we shall

shortly, or in a few weeks, bid them good bye. We are enjoying comfortable health. Our kindest regards to you and all the Saints. Brother LeGrand Young has gone to the State of New York to see some of his friends.
