Murderers Executed.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., 18.—John

Carl was executed at Paris, Ill.,

to-day, for the murder of his wife,

which occurred near Eldridge, Ill.,

Aug. 29, 1874. Nathan Burgess

was executed at Edgingham, Ill.,

to-day, for the murder of Joseph

Robbins, at Kankakee Bridge, Ill.,

on the 20th of Oct. last.

The "Champlain."

BOSTON, 18.—The ship Champlain

of Boston, which was owned by W. H. Kin-

man & Co. and others of Boston;

the ship and freight are insured for

\$125,000. The cargo, consisting of

general merchandise, was valued

at about \$600,000, and was insured

in New York.

PHILADELPHIA, 18.—The Presi-

dent, to-day, inspected the Centen-

ennial Exhibition, and expressed sur-

prise and gratification in respect to

both the vast dimensions of the

buildings and their rapid progress

toward completion. He took the

p. m. train for Long Beach.

At the session of the National

Board of Trade, this p. m., the fol-

lowing in relation to the Centen-

ennial Exposition was unanimously

adopted:

"Resolved that as a body we feel

an unhesitating conviction that the

success of the enterprise is already

assured, and we commend the fur-

therance of the work to the pride

and patriotism of the citizens in

every section of our country."

The committee on transportation

submitted the following:

"Whereas the facilities exist in

our system of transportation, which

are an unnecessary burden on com-

mercial interests and also upon

every producer and consumer; and

whereas prominent among these

are the construction of railways

mainly by the proceeds of bonds

without the payment of the stock

subscribed; the watering of

stocks on prosperous roads to afford

a plausible pretext for imposing on

the public an oppressive tariff of

charges; and whereas the limit of a

state's power to regulate the work

of railways among various sub-

jects, sleeping and palace cars, ex-

presses, and other facilities, which

are of great importance to the

public, and which are of great im-

portance to the public, and which

from Hamburg, known as August,

was crushed before leaving the

ship. The crew saved nothing but

a few articles of clothing. Shortly

after leaving the ship the fog rose

and lighted the schooner Mendoc-

ino. They pulled for her and

were taken on board. The ship was

loaded with a general cargo, includ-

ing a lot of coal and pig iron, con-

signment to Geo. Howes & Co.

Seizing the Central Pacific.
