Over Park in Austria.

CONCERNING IRELAND.

A Platform Adopted by a Committee of Conservatives—Other Items.

London, Nov. 13.—The executive committee of the Conservative association has drafted a platform to be adopted at a great party caucus at Liverpool on Saturday next. The proposed conference is to be held in Liverpool concerning Ireland. The conference will be asked to endorse the intention of the ministers to extend local government and to grant autonomy to Ireland. At the same time it is declared that the inequalities arising from existing "Irish" dispensary representation must be remedied. Other important planks provide for an extension of the franchise to women who are land owners or house occupiers, the creation of a commission to inquire into the conduct of the census, and legislation to enable the local authorities to acquire and to facilitate the erection of all rural buildings, as far as possible, for agricultural and to urge Conservatives to support labor estimates everywhere who appeal to water public life upon them. This plank, containing a proposal to prohibit the most against labor candidates in purely labor interests, is likely to offend, to encourage a split in the Radical ranks.

A resolution proposed by Howard Vincent, an eager advocate of imperial federation, who has just returned from America full of wrath against the McKinley tax, is to prohibit the payment of taxes to the British Empire.

Starting evidence has been laid before the later committee in regard to the condition of operatives in the textile districts of Lancashire and Cheshire. Of the workers' most wages, ranging from sixteen shillings weekly, a system of twelve hours, for skilled laborers, and forty-eight hours for unskilled laborers. A single five-centimes a week's pay. Many workmen live in a state of semi-starvation. Trunk sellers, seamstresses, laundry girls, and others in active existence, and the factory acts are openly defied.

The British admiralty is much exercised over the recent series of accidents in the gunnery trials of British warships. Five vessels recently have officially been declared to be carrying unreliable guns. In the 13-ton gun of the "Dreadnaught" it has been in commission only a few weeks, a crack has developed in the inner tubes after firing a few rounds of bad gunpowder. The gun has been taken in, and now lies in the dockyard. Similar accidents have happened to guns on the "Victoria" and "Queen Parelli" generally. These heavy weapons are becoming distrustful, and the admiralty is anxious to have them strengthened. Meanwhile the 75-ton guns of the French fleet are acting perfectly.

Frenchmen are interested in the controversy raised by T. F. O'Connor in attacking Sir H. P. of organizing a split in the Parliamentary party by introducing a motion of censure in Paris. O'Connor's attack on Sir H. P. who succeeds him as manager of the London Star has led to the disclosure that Arnold jerome, liberal whip, gave to Arnold jerome, conservative whip, the authority of Gladstone. O'Connor therefore is left in the position of charging Gladstone with the initiative of the rupture in the Irish party.

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

Paris, Nov. 13.—During the great storm a fishing lugger was driven ashore near Bolligen, and sixteen of the men aboard were drowned.

Berlin, Nov. 13.—It was announced today that the signature of a treaty of alliance had been given by Germany and Italy has been signed.

Carmarthen Point, S. C., Nov. 13.—The British ship "Surat," belonging to Tarmouth, N. S., bound from Mysore for Port Townshend, to return at Carmarthen Point, S. C., because four of the crew were drowned.

Dover, Oct. 20.—A. Las Vegas, N. M., special to the "Advertiser": It is learned by a special from Kingston, N. M., that Wm. Hutchins and son, miners, were killed in a mine in a timber cut by the premature explosion of twenty-five pounds of powder.

Schaffhausen, Nov. 13.—A weight wreck occurred last night on the lake of Constance. The boat, which had been built with care, and the engineer and steersman seriously hurt.

Baden, Nov. 13.—A dispute from Eber, one of the towns in the great coal producing district of Germany, resulted in the death of three of the miners, and two others were injured.

Bremen, Nov. 13.—The storm was felt with unusual severity throughout Bremen. At Antwerp the shipping in the harbor suffered severely. Much damage was done at Ghent and other places.

Lotto, Nov. 13.—The jury in the Wessendorf case was called in at noon by Judge Leo of the Prussian circuit court, and reported that they were unable to agree, and were discharged.
