ANSWERS SUDDEN SUMMONS.
James Burton, Well Known Engineer, Passes Away at 51.

Eureka, June 6.—Monday, one of the most known citizens of the city, James Burton, suddenly passed into the other world. Mr. Burton had been engaged at the Standard-Eureka mine as a engineer and started as usual for his engine room this morning, when half way up the steep hill leading to the mine he became faint and nearly fainted Isaac Barnes and his son, responded to Eureka for a car, condition, and had him removed to his home, where he breathed his last, having suffered a death resulting from heart failure or heart attack of some kind. Deceased was 51 years of age, and before coming to Eureka, he, about 10 years ago, had held positions in the principal railroads of the country, and was a member of the good standing of Masonic No. 20, Brethren Lodge of Protective Engineers of Salt Creek. Mr. Burton was also a charter member of Little Lodge No. 71, B. P. O. Elks. He was a native of Vicksburg, Miss., and his only near relative, who has been noticed, is his parents' sudden end. Funeral services were conducted at the Odd Fellows hall last night by the members of Little Lodge No. 71. P. B. O. Elks. The remains are being held awaiting word from his son.
