ANNUAL MEETINGS OF THE SAN PEDRO

That and Empire Construction Company Elect Directors-Work to Begin in Utah the Coming Summer.

The stockholders of the San Pedro, | Los Angeles & Salt Lake railroad company and the Empire Construction company met in the offices of the company in the McCornick block this morning and elected directors for the coming year. These in turn will meet in Los Angeles February 10 and elect officers. Only three changes were made, the names of F. K. Rule and Ross W Smith of Los Angeles being substituted for those of George B. Leighton of St. Louis and C. W. Clark, in the rallroad company, and that of Ross W. Smith, vice George B. Leighton in the construction company.

When seen after the meeting Vice President J. Ross Clark was very en thusiastic regarding the outlook for the completion of the road through to the coast, and in answer to questions said: "Of course I cannot say anything about just which route we shall take in and out of this city as we do not want to be held up on our right-ofway. We have filed two maps bere in the land office and more will follow from time to time. Everything is progressing nicely and I expect that the joint survey will be completed b the end of this month when we will b in shape to decide upon the rest of the route. The joint survey agreement is the best thing that could have hap-pened for now we, neither of us, will cross tracks, which would have been most dangerous, especially if the cross-

ngs were frequent." Mr. Clark then went on to describe the terms of the agreement whereby both companies would do their share in construction and maintenance of track along the lines previously pub-lished in the "News." Continuing he said: "We expect to

Says He Does Not Anticipate Any Radical Chapges in the Near Future -Railroad News.

Acting Traffic Manager T. M. Schu macher of the Oregon Short Line returned to Salt Lake this morning after having been absent in the East for nearly a month past, the major portion of which time he has been flitting between Chicago and New York. Evidently his trip East has agreed with him, for when seen this morning he looked a picture of perfect health and happiness.

Mr. Schumacher said that he had ab solutely nothing to give out which would be of public interest. He stated that he did not anticipate that there would be any circulars issued from headquarters at present and further that distressing title "Acting" which has been so much in vogue around the Oregon Short Line head-quarters was still in statu quo.

Coming down to the rumors that have been rife to the effect that he was shortly to sever his connection with the Oregon Short Line to take an important position in New York, as rep-resentative of the Harriman lines, Mr. Schumacher, while admitting that he had heard of them, stated that he had nothing to give out on the matter.

AFTER COAL.

Some More Light on Operations in Emery County by Railroads.

Major Wm. H. Worthon throws additional light upon the work of the surveying corps in Emery county in an interview in the Progress:

"The surveying corps was minus a surveying outfit," said Mr. Worthon. "It was headed by Wm. Miles of Fremont, Wayne county, who wanted to secure an option on a big block of coal land in Ferron canyon. He proposed to survey a straight line along the moal measures from Ferron to Muddy creek, and would have purchased every claim in sight for his kind of exchange, which appeared to be jawbone. Mr. Miles is the head of a grand unorganized concern, entitled the Utah Coal, Mining and Transportation company,' and hi associates are Tobe McCiellan and Axel Nielsen and others, from I don't know where. They will issue stock of this corporation for approved coal land. I know nothing about the concern or its promoters. Perhaps the proposition was all right, but it didn't look good to me, for good Emery county coal land looks better than an order for stock in a hot-air mining proposition

'Another embyrotic concern that, according to the Wayne county man, is going to make Emery county a .topindustrial notcher amongst the great centers of the universe, is the Utah Southern railroad. This is to be a new north and south railroad system con necting with the Harriman lines at Og. den or Salt Lake at the north and with Yume, Ariz., at the south. The cos measures of this county, therefore The coal vould thus be drawn upon to supply the enormous consumption of the Southern Pacific road itself in both northern and southern territory, besides filling a long-felt fuel want in mining camps and other towns in Ari-zona, New Mexico and Southern Call-fornia. Just when the dirt will com-mence to fly in the construction of this road, Mr. Miles was unable to say. One thing I am certain of, however, that there's billions of tons of splendid coal in Emery county awaiting the advent of a railroad to furnish the market."
